

## SALT LAKERS IN GOTHAM

Sarasio Celebrates the 34th Anniversary—Ten Descendants of President Young Together—Lucy Gates Sings at a Max O'Rell Lecture.

New York, March 23.—Monday March 17, "Sarasio" had an anniversary in the large ballroom of the Waldorf Astoria. It was 34 years old that day, and many were the celebrities present. Mrs. Charles Dennison the president, was very happy in the opening address, giving a brief outline of this famous club's work the past year, and complimenting the members on their zeal and devotion to the club, also paying a high tribute to its late president, Mrs. Croly. A Mrs. Ostram wears the gold pineapple, showing that she has been identified with "Sarasio" twenty-five years. Some well known faces were distinguished among the many writers, actresses and clubwomen present, among others, Margaret Merrington, author of "Captain Letterblair," Sothern's old play, and Minnie Gale Haynes, the actress, so well remembered in Salt Lake, who recited Kipling's "East and West." It was easy to be seen that she had lost none of the fire and magnetism with which she in-

vested all her characters in by-gone days. Since her marriage, the public have seen very little of this charming woman, a fact much to be regretted; Miss Warner, the author of "Creeche," was fitting about in her quaint way. Reading a notice in a home paper that Mrs. Nelden of Salt Lake, would be there, we were very anxious to find her, but were not successful, owing to the crush.

On the same evening and in the same ballroom, Mme. Emma Calve gave a folk song recital assisted by Saligmac and Gilbert of the Metropolitan Opera company. Calve was charming in her native chansons, and exquisitely dressed. The admission price was high, but for all that, there were no empty seats.

The 17th day of the month being the 60th anniversary of the organization of the Relief societies throughout the world, our little society observed it by holding a special meeting at the hall on 15th street, Mrs. Laine presiding. Mrs. Phoebe Y. Beattie of the general board, being present, was asked to give some instruction in relation to the work; she responded, and in an interesting way, gave an account of the first meeting held in Nauvoo, in 1842, with Emma

Smith, wife of the Prophet Joseph Smith, as the first president. She was followed by Mrs. Dougall, Mrs. Gates and Mrs. Taylor. Nearly every lady present spoke briefly on the subject, and it was voted a delightful evening throughout.

Willard Young; five daughters, Mrs. Dougall, Mrs. Gates, Mrs. Beattie, Mrs. Ferguson and Mrs. Easton; three granddaughters, Mrs. C. S. Burton, Miss Mary Young, Miss Gladys Ferguson, and one grandson, Mr. J. Wesley Young.
