Lady Jane Franklin is reported in our dispatches. She was the second daughter of John Griffin, Esq., F. S. A., and was born about 1805. She was of French Hugnenot de-scent by her mother's side. In 1826 she became the second wife of Sir John Franklin, and in 1836 accompanied him to Yan Diemau's Land, on his appointment to the govern-

ship of that colony. While there e rendered a very important service to the colony by paying out of her own private purse a bounty of

ten shillings each for the destruction of a dangerous species of serpent, which consequently was soon

exterminated

Ludy Franklip almost exhausted ber fortune in endeavoring to discover the fate of her husband. In 1848 she offered rewards of two and quently she fitted out expeditions for the same purpose, chiefly at her own cost, and supplementary to these sent by the English govern-ment. That under Captain (now Sir Leopoid) McClintock was suc-cessful in making the melancholy discovery, and bringing proof, that Sir John and his party must have perished as early as Jama 11, 1847, after having liscovered the north-west passage, The Royal Geogra-phical Society conferral upon Lady Franklin the gold xo dal of their founder in 1860.
