CHEYENNE, WYO. WORLD'S FAIR COMMISSION.

Wyoming's Exhibit Wins 125 Prizes-Surplus from Small Appropriation. Special Correspondence.

Special Correspondence. Cheyenne, Wyo, Jan. 3.—The board of Wyoming commissioners to the world's fair has rendered its final report, which shows a remarkable condition of affairs. Two years ago the state legislature ap-propriated \$20,000 for an exhibit of the state's resources and products at St. Louis. A commission, composed of Gov. Brocks, W. C. Dening, C. B. Richard-son, Geo. E. Pexton, J. L. Baird and W. H. Holliday, was appointed by the late Gov Richards, with Mr. Richardson as commissioner-in-chief and Mr. Dem-ing as secretary.

ing as secretary, The commission gathered and exhibited at St. Louis displays of gold, copper, iron, coal and other precious and base miner-als, agricultural products, vegetables, fruits, manufactures, etc., and despite the als, agricultural products, vegetables, fruits, manufactures, etc., and despite the fact that the state is small in population and development has hardly been com-menced. Wyoming was awarded 120 prizes, many of which were grand and first awards, and this in face of the fact that the state only appropriated \$22000 to pre-pare the display. And the work of the commission is made the more remarkable when it is known that of this appropria-tion, more than \$5,000 will be turned back into the state treasury. In 1883 he moved from Mona to Mexico, and in 1884 returned to this country, set-tling in this valley, where he remained up to the time of his death. He was mar-ried to Hannah Gittens in 1863. Seven childrn and nine graadchildren survive him. Deceased was highly respected in this community, especially known for his straightforward and honest dealing.

PATRIARCH STEWART DEAD.

Alvin Franklin Stuart, who died here Dec, 12, was born in Georgetown, Mad-ison Co., New York, April 18, 1819. Bishop J. M. Horne, President Collins, R. Hakes, Patriarch Noah Brimhall were the speakers at his funeral. They spoke feelingly of his earnest labors in the Church since his baptism in

1842. He was a friend to the Prophet Joseph and stood guard while he slept just before he was taken to Cartage jail, where he was martyred.
