GLASMAN WINS AT OGDEN POLLS

Entire Republican Ticket With One Exception Piles Up Decisive Vote.

BIG AVERAGE MAJORITY.

General Average on All Offices Except Mayor Runs About One Thousand Ahead of Democrats.

OGDEN, Nov. 2.—The Republican ticket was successful at the polls in Ogden Friday. William Glasman, Republican candidate for mayor, winning by 153 majority over Alex. Brewer, Democratic candidate for re-election. The entire Republican ticket with one exception piled up a decisive vote.

Murray, Nov. 2.—The Independent carried everything before them at Tuesday's election. Bill Bentz being elected mayor by about 500 majority. C. L. Miller, candidate for mayor on the Citizens ticket polled 252 votes, which was the largest vote polled on that ticket. For city attorney J. L. Rowe won over D. W. Moffet. Moffet is the present incumbent. William Vankirk, city recorder, was re-elected. James Thompson, Carl Moxley, was chosen justice of the peace over C. H. Banks, who held that position. In the councilmanic fight John Park won over David Dick in the First ward; John Thompson over Henry Housen in the Second; James Cahoon over Gottlieb Berger in the Third; and David Frame in the Fourth, and E. D. McMillan, candidate on both sides, was unanimously chosen in the Fifth.

Lehi, Nov. 2.—A heavy vote, much receding and the turning of this former Republican stronghold into the hands of Democracy and prohibition were the striking features of Tuesday's election at Lehi. The average vote was 95, and all but 300 were scratched tickets. The Democratic councilmen were elected by a large majority, and they are pledged to carry out the provisions of the city ordinance passed by a Republican council, providing for the closing of the saloons in this city Jan. 1 next.
Out of eight candidates on the city ticket the Democrats elected six men and the Republicans two. G. A. Goates, R., was elected recorder by 128 majority, and J. C. Gough, R., councilman for the two-year term. The Democrats elected are:
Edward Southwick, mayor, by 59 votes over James H. Gardner, R.; John Stoker, treasurer, W. S. Garney, councilman for long term; George G. Webb and R. J. Whipple, councilmen, two-year term; Eli Kendall, justice of the peace.

PAYSON.

Payson, Nov. 2.—The fusion ticket was victorious here at the polls Tuesday, and the candidates elected are all pledged to prohibition. The Citizens ticket, of anti-prohibitionists, failed to elect a single officer. The election was hotly contested on both sides, and one of the heaviest city votes ever gotten out in Payson was polled. The candidates elected are as follows:

Logan, Nov. 2.—A Republican landslide carried everything before it in Logan Tuesday, and incidentally the city voted "dry" by a vote of 2 to 1. Anderson, Republican candidate for mayor, won out over Kimball by a majority of 64.
Miss May Benson, Democratic candidate for recorder, was elected, and Evans of the Third ward, was the only councilmanic candidate elected by the Democrats. The results were as follows:

REFORM FORCES ARE DIVIDED.

One Councilman on Wet Ticket Elected And There is Some Talk of a Contest.

(Special to The News.)
Provo, Nov. 2.—The municipal election closed with some surprises with the election of the entire general ticket of the Independent Citizens party—the anti-prohibitionists. The reason for the victory of the prohibition party is that its forces were divided between two sets of candidates, although other causes entered into the defeat of the prohibition tickets, and the prohibition forces would be stronger if the test was made on the prohibition question unencumbered with other conditions.

PROHIBITION COUNCIL.

The independent elected only one councilman, Mr. Bott of the First ward. This makes the council safely prohibitionist and there is no chance of the present prohibition ordinance being repealed. This ordinance goes into effect Jan. 1, of next year, so the city will be prohibition in spite of the election of the independent general ticket. The reason for the defeat of the prohibition councilmen is that both the prohibition parties fused on the councilmen, thereby contesting the election of the councilmen on the prohibition ticket; but this is probably more a wish of theirs making the talk than a reality. If there should be anything in the point and a test prove successful for the independent, then the prohibition ordinance will of course be repealed.
