The report of City Auditor Alf to the finance committee of the city council on Monday showed that on May 1, 1905, there was a balance on hand in the bank to the credit of the general fund of the city of \$16,185,27 while on May 1, of this year, after four months of "American" rule, there was an overdraft against that fund of \$29,521,-11. The report also showed that dur-ing the first four months of this year there was an increase in the expenses of the city of \$36,000 over the first four months of the last year of the Morris administration while the receipts of the city treasury showed a decrease of over \$74,000 as compared with the first four months of the previous year.
