THE first Thursday of each month has, from the early days of the Church, been set apart as a season for fasting and prayer, blessing of little children confirming baptized members, and tendering offerings for the support of the poor. Although fast meetings are an ordinance of the Church, they are in some respects almost a dead letter. The attendance at these meetings is generally very small. This is partially accounted for by the fact that they are held at a time when the adult male portion of the community is actively engaged in the usual vocations of life. Most of the
