

'He Died of Brokers, Sir.'

We thought of Haydon, the Historical Painter, and the puddle of black blood that ran out from under the door of his studio, where at the foot of one of his pictures the weary Artist disengaged himself at once of debt and life, with the friendly pistol.

Yet no man can read Haydon's life, without the conviction that his misfortunes and his suicide were due to the debt, the rolling of which while he could roll it, was the poison of his life, and which finally grew too great for his strength.

There is now at our hand the written life of the great orator Sheridan. How its shipwreck and its closing sorrows and shames were the consequences of his life-long indebtedness!

It cost him his seat in Parliament—threw him out of Drury Lane—cast him into prison—sent him to the pawnbroker's—sowed the seeds of domestic discord—drove him to hard drinking; and finally broke down the ornament of the British Senate, and utterly ruined the great man, whom Byron pronounced to be the author of the best oration, the best opera, the best address, and the best Comedy ever produced in England.

The table companion, counselor, associate, and friend of Princes, Prime Ministers, and Dukes, Debt carried him bedridden to the disgrace and horrors of an arrest while he was dying!

A brutal officer in the very act of carrying him in the blankets, upon which he laid, to a sponging house, was deterred from his purpose only by the suggestion of the physician that he would be hung for murder if Sheridan died on the way!

The youth of this country should be taught to avoid Debt as the bane of their lives. PAY AS YOU GO! is a golden maxim. It should be the rule of private life. True Economy would make it the Governmental practice.
