There is now at our hand the written life of the great orator Sheridan. How its shipwreck and its closing sorrows and shames were the consequences of his life-long indebtedness!

It cost him his seat in Parliament-threw him out of Drury Lane-cast him into prisonsent him to the pawnbroker's- sowed the seeds of domestic discord-drove him to hard drinking; and finally broke down the ornament of the British Senate, and utterly ruined the great man, whom Byron pronounced to be the author of the best oration, the best opera, the best address, and the best Comedy ever produced in England.
