

BOISE HAS AN ELOPEMENT

Mrs. John Lilja and W. L. Barnes
Skip Out Together.

STORY OF AN INFATUATION.

While Mr. Lilja Feels Keenly His
Loss, Mrs. Barnes Seems to Be
Perfectly Reconciled.

Boise, Ida., June 20.—A peculiar and somewhat sensational elopement has just occurred in Boise. W. L. Barnes and Mrs. John Lilja have departed for "pastures green," leaving Mrs. Barnes and Mr. Lilja to mourn their loss.

It seems that Mr. Barnes and Mr. Lilja have been, for some time past, engaged in the lumber yard of M. H. Goodwin & Co., and have, to all appearances, been fast friends. About a year ago, Barnes and Mrs. Lilja became enamored of each other and, while both lived with the lawful spouse in apparent peaceful content, the name of passion did not become quiescent. The state of affairs seemed to be apparent to the spouses of the "erring couple," but no steps appear to have been taken to break the spell.

A few days ago the small child of Mr. and Mrs. Barnes, the link which bound them together, sickened and died. The husband and father attended the funeral and the next day drew his savings from the bank and bought a ticket to Portland. On the same day Mr. Lilja gave his wife money to purchase a ticket, and she is said to have ticketed from here to Caldwell, joining Barnes at that place for Portland.

Before leaving, Barnes gave his wife a deed to their home here, and it is said that Lilja gave her wife \$100 for expenses. The "young couple" are said to be between 35 and 40 years of age and Mrs. Lilja had a daughter of some three years which they took with them. She also has an adopted daughter, a few years older, which she left with her husband.

Marital troubles seem to run in the family of Mrs. Barnes. Her brother has just figured in a divorce proceeding, as defendant, in which his wife has obtained a divorce from him in our district court, and her sister is said to have been divorced no less than three times.

The elopement seems to be satisfactory to the parties left behind. Mrs. Barnes stated that she had known for some time past that Barnes and Mrs. Lilja were infatuated with each other, but that she could do nothing to prevent it. She says she knew he was going away with the Lilja woman, but that she simply kissed him good-bye and bid him God speed. "What good would it do me," she said, "to have him arrested and locked up? I could do nothing but let him go." Mr. Lilja seems to take it a trifle harder, though he says he had known he was going to lose her for some time past; that she loved Barnes and nothing he could do would keep her.

"THOMAS G. GLEASON," a letter addressed to Mrs. A. Fox, Covington, Ky., calling her "in the," said he was up against hard circumstances and was either going to hades or Poetville. He didn't know which, but would let her know later.

ANOTHER BIG CROWD AT TRACK

See Splendid Races Among Professionals and Amateurs.

ANOTHER RECORD SMASHED

Hopper and Hoffman Both Break Eight Lap Track Mark—Atter's Hot Dash—Corbett's Training.

There was another big crowd at the saucer track last evening and every person in the crowd got the worth of the money paid. It is quite evident, by the steady increase of the crowds, that the cycle game has gained a strong foothold here and the outlook is brighter than ever. The track was crowded to its capacity last evening and the races were among the best of the season.

The principal race was the match between Agraz and Downing, two of the fastest amateurs on the track. The distance was five miles, motor paced. Downing was a surprise to the crowd as he hugged his pace like a veteran pro and although at times he wobbled a little he was always there with the spirit when needed and did Agraz had the better pace of the two but he was unable to hang on. On the second lap Downing sneaked around the track and took the lead which he maintained until the second mile when Agraz secured the lead. On the third mile he again passed Agraz and was never headed after that although the latter made desperate efforts to take the lead. Agraz lost his pace but caught it again soon, but his failure to hang on gave Downing a lap which he held until the finish.

The professionals did some fast work in the quarter mile record trial and Hopper and Hoffman both broke the record for an eight lap track. They both covered the distance in 24:3.5.

The five mile professional race brought out a hard fight between the rivals, Hopper and Hoffman, but the latter carried off the honors by a wheel. The summary follows: Quarter mile professional record trial—Hopper and Hoffman, 24:3.5; breaking the eight lap record of 24:4.5; Stevens 25, Chapman 25.5—Samuelson 26, Leyland 25.

Five mile professional race—Hopper, 10:55; Samuel 9:55, Stevens 6, Turville 5, Burris 2, Hoffman 7, Staver 1, Leyland 4.

Half mile amateur, final—C. Redman, Starbuck, Agraz, Limberg, time, 1:07. Five mile match race, motor paced, between Agraz and Downing—won by Downing by one lap, time, 8:48.

ATTEMPTS LONG JOURNEY.

Two Men Leave 'Presco for New York in 12-Hour Power Auto.

San Francisco, June 20.—E. T. Fitch of Jefferson, Ohio and M. C. Knapton of New York, left this city today in a 12-hour power, single cylinder gasoline motor car of American make, on their journey of traveling through to New York. The trip is undertaken to demonstrate what an automobile of moderate power can do over mountain and desert roads of the worst description.

The motorists arrived in this city from the east last week and are unfamiliar with the western country and roads. Their main object is to demonstrate the reliability of the car in construction with ordinary gasoline motor cars, except that it is geared lower and carries an extra gasoline tank holding six gallons in addition to the regular supply. It also has a provision for overcoming the effects of the rough roads.

The route chosen lies through Port Costa, Sacramento, Placerville, in this state; Carson City, Reno, Washoe, Winnemucca in Nevada, thence to Salt Lake; thence over Green River and Glenwood Springs, Colo., to Denver. From Denver eastward to route has been selected as yet. A camera and instruments for accurate observations of grades and altitudes form part of the equipment carried and it is the intention to gather much valuable material for future reference.
