### KILLING OF PARLEY BYBEE

Shocking Accident is the Result of Careless Handling of a Shotgun.

Business in the District Court—Christmas "News"—A Scrimmage for Pennies—News Notes.

OGDEN, DEC. 21, 1899.

Yesterday afternoon the sad news reached Ogden of a shocking shooting accident at South Hooper, Davis county, resulting in the instant death of Parley Bybee. According to the report of a gentleman just in from the scene of the tragedy, it appears that at about 3 p. m. yesterday, Parley Bybee, a young man about 19 years of age, with a young man about 14, were handling a shotgun which they had loaded but which could not discharge, so one of the boys "dared" the other to stand up and be shot at. The Bybee boy accepted the challenge and the smaller boy raised the gun, and taking a fool-hardy aim at his companion, pulled the trigger, and to his great astonishment the gun went off, the entire load passing into the Bybee boy's head. The victim fell to the ground and expired immediately. Help was soon at his side, but too late as death was instantaneous. Joseph Scotted, the boy who unwittingly shot his companion, was almost frantic with grief, and seemed quite uncontrollable. The Bybee boy is a son of Mrs. Mary Bybee, the widow of the late David Bybee, the family are old and well known settlers in Weber county. The family have the universal sympathy of the people. The shooting was purely accidental, no fault can be placed on either of the boys except that they should not have handled the gun so carelessly, which they knew to be loaded.

### DISTRICT COURT.

In the second district court, before Judge H. H. Holapp: In the amended complaint in the case of Thomas Nelson vs. David Evans and Lindsay R. Rogers, it is set forth that the plaintiff holds a contract with the defendant to pay him one-half the amount they received for prosecuting a certain case against the S. P. R. R. He having furnished the defendants with testimony and witnesses to fight their case. He asked judgment in the sum of \$1,719.20, alleging that the defendant is one-half the judgment Evans & Rogers received in the suit against the railroad company.

The Ogden Street Railway company filed their answer in the action of Farr against them. The answer sets forth that the railway company did pay their truck along 16th street to Glenwood park, about 16th street, and that it had been sanctioned by the Ogden city council.

The jury for the January term of court has been released until further notice.

Jones, Preston D. John, A. O. Smart and T. N. Taylor.

Mr. Choules was one of the most active and popular church workers of the city, and will be greatly missed as a citizen. He has, for many years, been the leader of the Third ward choir, and was quite prominent in musical lines. He was 52 years of age, was born at Burbridge, Wiltshire, England, and has resided in Provo for a great number of years.
