SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 1.

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 1.
Our correspondent "Ork" writes from Goshen Precinct, says:
Among other local items we will soon be to chronicle the death of Goshen. It is a decline very fast, and will soon be numbered with the things of the past. But our efforts have sprung up a healthy one, which shows signs of thrift; and it needs time for its development.
Our new location is situated about four miles southeast of the old one, on a 'bench,' the place was selected by President Young and a city plot was laid off by Surveyor Fox last summer. The people are mostly moved up and improvement goes on rapidly. The 'shoppers' have left us enough to live on bread and seed, if it be kept here. There is a good prospect for plenty of potatoes, and things in general are getting better and better locally.
SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 1.
The Sacramento Reporter says: "The locomotive, George L. Woods, for the Oregon Central Railroad, is nearly ready to take an airing on the Central Pacific, which, probably, it belongs. The engine in question was used in the wreck of the passenger train, and is probably indebted for its name to a certain gentlemanly conductor on the Central Pacific Railroad."
SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 1.
A correspondent of the San Francisco Times, records a singular discovery made in the Morning Star mine, in finding of a silver arrow head embedded in a piece of ore, with the small piece of the shaft of a tree attached to its point. He says: "This curious relic was found by Mr. Davidson, the Silver Creek Mill in handling over a lot of ore, he happened to his mill for experimental tests. This occurred some time in September. I saw the arrow-head the next day after it was found. It was about four inches long, an inch broad at the base, where it was attached to the shaft, and split down about an inch and pressed apart, evidently for the purpose of giving it a better hold on the wood of the shaft. At the point it was about half an inch wide, and the whole head was of a uniform thickness of an eighth of an inch. The silver was slightly alloyed with tin, but otherwise very pure. It was perfectly incrustated with rich sulphide of silver about half an inch thick, and being sealed off, thus revealed this the most wonderful relic of an early habitation in the Sierras. The depth of the ore, from which the arrow was taken, was not less than 100 feet. Will some of your wise men of the Academy of Sciences tell us where, how and when this wonderful relic got into the fissure? It is now filled with a vein of the Morning Star mine."
SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 1.
At Richmond, Cache county, August 15, Janet Watson, wife of Joseph Watson, aged 70 years, died after a long illness.
The deceased was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, March 21, 1810, and immigrated the following year. Her faith in the Gospel was unswerving. She manifested an unflinching courage in the discharge of every duty, and died with a full hope of a glorious resurrection.
In Person, T. T. John Chaffee, August 27, 1888, aged 60 years, 3 months and 12 days.
The deceased was born in Londonderry, Ireland; he was a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints for over 25 years, and belonged to the High Priest's Quorum. He was an honest, industrious and God-fearing man, and was universally loved and respected.
