The smelter has proven that there are good values in the ores of the company's mines, but it has also proven that it was erected and put in commission too soon in the development of the properties and it will be closed down and the whole attention of the down and the whole attention of the management given to the development of the mines. The truth seems to be that none of the mies around Milford are yet in a position to give out bir ounts of ore with the sole exception of the Cactus, so it cannot run as a coston smelter for yet awhile.
