**TO FORTUITISTS.**

Call for a Territorial Convention to this City During the Fair.

RAIL LARGE CITY, SEP. 16, 1894.

To the public at large, and to fortuitists in particular:

Realizing the fact that the horticultural interests in our Territory are now occupying the attention of many of our most influential citizens at home, we feel it our duty to call to the attention of the public at large, and to the horticultural interests in particular, that one of the most profitable and general industries of the Territory, this most be so, from the nature of the case, as the horticulture, and will be acknowledged to be unimportant. And whereas, the

development of this industry have not recently slumbered, and our legislative attempts to develop fruit growing have been offset by the numerous provisions that hamper this industry and we have been unable to secure the assistance of those for the want of legislation and a knowledge of how they may be corrected, until the session of our last legislature. It is our earnest desire to bring to the destruction of fruit pests and having for the general and the awakening of a rural population to the fact that the fruit grower with modern plans a vast improvement in both the quality of fruit produced this season and the general increase in the production of fruit. This was enactment of our last legislature and the outlining and persistent efforts of our county legislature are now being made to bring to the fore the power to be used to the great possibilities of the future and make us so still more efficient and greater efforts to be made in the future. After upon the present law, we regard it as only a step in the right direction, and would be followed up by more significant legislation and the fruit grower's experience and growth will demonstrate our legislature still more capable. Fruit legislation has only been made in the past and it is our desire to see the people who make fruit growing their business, and who will be the contributors of the State's prosperity. We are now in the process of making these legislative and to do good and efficient work requires a thorough organization of the fruit grower. We are now the Mail Lake County Board of Horticulture, at their last meeting, appointed a committee to issue a call for

throughout the Territory to assemble in convention on October 21st, 1904, in Salt Lake City. We have selected this time because of its being the best time for holding the annual session of the Territorial Fair and at such a time people throughout the Territory make it their point to be present. This definite place of meeting will be announced later. We cordially invite all and hope to have a large attendance. Compelled to Stop at Native's to Fill  
Out for the Journey to the  
Forest with Lake Kaituma

On the 10th, we went to the beach. The next day we lost three, and on the 11th concluded to kill what was left and have one beef before leaving the beach. Wood for fire was plentiful. Crabs were cut and thrown into the

Leaving the Idaho valley, on our trip to the Snake River country, we found the entire company, with its livestock, on the camp where water was so scarce the camp was still mud waiting these animals.

On this evening of the sixth and after supper the camp was rather quiet. Father, Father-in-law, Levi W. Hancock and I were sitting on the porch and inquired in regard to traveling in order and keeping the "commitments of God," in regard to the trip to the Snake River, for in truth there was and had been a little friction among brethren. But at this meeting I believe everything was settled and the trip was made this time on we had mutual prayer meetings. On the 11th we reached the Snake River, where the company was joined and they believed we would be given more food and they it was not clear out horses. The next morning we saw large quantities of corn and various sorts of roots lying in the sun to dry.

On the 11th we crossed a dry plain to a place where there was a small stream to give out water and could go no farther. I saw several water holes called holes.
