Civil Service Reform Abolished. WASHINGTON, 10.— The depart-ments have issued a circular an-nouncing the abolition of the civil service reform rules governing their respective departments wherever respective, departments wherever operative, and announcing a return to the former method of the ap-pointment of employes, as previded for by section 164 of the revised statutes, enacted June 22, 1874, which is, that ne clerk shall be apwhich is, that no clerk shall be ap-pointed to any department in either of the four classes, until he has been examined and found qualified by a board of three exam-iners; to consist of the chief of the bureau or office into which such
