This step indicates a very thorough canvass of the country is to be made for funds to carry on the Republican campaign work. HAINS' WIFE'S CONFESSION Captain First Thought His Sus-

> picions Wrong, Later Developments Confirmed Them.

DIDN'T CHALLENGE ANNIS

His Chief Counsel Says What Unbalanced His Mind Was Wife's Counter Charges.

New York, Ang. 19 .- After being out 22 minutes, a coroner's jury tonight brought in a verdict that William E. Annis, who was killed last Saturday at Bayside, L. L, came to his death as the result of pistol shot wounds inflicted by Capt. Peter C. Hains, Jr., It is a set of the set

more than 20 minutes, When the jurymen filed into the room and the foreman announced the verdict there was a demonstration. A crowd gathered around Thornton Jenkins Hains and began to question as to the tragedy in which he played such an important part. He was ask-ed if he feit justified in holding a crowd at bay with a revolver while his brother shot down Annis. Before Hains could reply, John F. McIntyre, chief counsel for the brothers, rushed to his side and shouted. "No, no, don't answer that

shouted. "No, no, don't answer that question. question." Only two witnesses we're called. They were Charles H. Roberts of Flush-ing, who testified that he was standing on the club house float when he heard the weath of which is hot and saw on the club house float when he heard the report of a pistoi shot and saw Capt. Hains in a kneeling position clining to the drooping body of Annis, as he emptied the contents of his re-volver into it, and Coroner's Physician Frey, who testilled that Annis came to his death from the bullet wounds.
