AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

Logan.—Bulletin No. 80 of the station on the irrigation investigations of 1901, is now in press.

Messrs. Jardine and Nelson have started the season's work at the vegetation house.

The A. C. Woman's club will hold the annual meeting this evening in the college readingroom. A brief program will be given, representative of the year's work, after which the evening will be spent in social discourse. About 100 guests have been invited and the affair promises to be one of the most brilliant functions of the season.

The debate between the Agricultural college and the B. Y. college last Saturday evening was largely attended. The A. C. won, receiving 84 points to 75 for the B. Y. C. The question was on the justification of the white race in the south in using all peaceable means to maintain supremacy in that section. Messrs. Stoddard and Porter of the A. C. presented the affirmative, adducing telling and unanswerable arguments; Messrs. Pihlson and Godfrey of the B. Y. C. made two able speeches in the negative, but were unable to convince the judges of the righteousness of their cause.

The cadets at drill hour last Wednesday marched through the corridors and about the grounds, headed by their beautiful new flag, purchased with the proceeds of the military ball given in February.

The reclamation of the alkali farm west of the Jordan is progressing very favorably; tons of alkali are being washed out daily and from present indications the land will be practically reclaimed at the end of the season.

Bulletin No. 19, on "Process Butter, a Dairy Fraud," by Prof. Clark and Mr. Crockett is being mailed.

Prof. Hutt has gone to the southeastern part of the state to investigate the horticultural conditions of the Grand valley. In connection with Prof. Merrill, an institute will be held at Moab.

Prof. Ball is conducting a spraying experiment in the orchard of Mr. J. B. Campbell at Providence, to destroy as completely as possible the codling moth. Dr. Widson and Prof. Hutt will conduct irrigation experiments in the same orchard.

Miss Theresa Neilson has just returned to her work after two weeks of sickness.

Prof. Cotey has just received three specimens of maple sugar and one of sirup for her domestic science museum, from a cousin in northern Vermont. One of these specimens was marked 100 by the judges of the Vermont Sugar-

mawers' association, where it had been displayed.

Miss Josephine Maughan, a senior, has been seriously ill, but is now recovering.
