MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL.

Finance and Other Weber County Business Before Commissioners.

School Finances for the Year—Hurt in a Bicycle Accident—Sunday School Excursion to Salt Lake.

City council met last evening and transacted the following business:

The committee on laws recommended that \$25 be tendered D. K. Farley in full payment of his judgment of \$100 obtained in the justice court, and the recommendation was adopted.

Pay rolls and miscellaneous orders in the amount of \$14.25 were ordered paid, while one bill of \$14.25 by the Utah Lumber company, was returned back to that firm for a requisition.

Two bids were received for the construction of a sewer in sewer district No. 1, W. M. McKee bid \$1,915, and J. P. O'Neil bid \$1,930. The bid of O'Neil was accepted, and the matter referred to the sewer committee and the city attorney for the necessary contract.

Mr. Abbott brought up the matter of the delinquency of the city attorney, but the council declined to grant them any leave of absence without a pay off. If they declined and lose the time while they are absent.

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OUTLOOK FOR SUGAR BEETS

Conditions Most Gratifying Throughout Lehi Factory District.

Eighty Percent of the Crop of 7,558 Acres Looking Well—Cultivation in Line of Irrigation.

Lehi, Utah, County, July 30.—The beet sugar crop throughout Salt Lake and Utah counties as well as in the districts of Sanpete and Sevier is looking remarkably well considering the dry season. Manager Cutler and Superintendent Austin returned late Saturday evening from a visit to the beet fields in the districts of Mapleton, Springville, Provo, Lake View, Pleasant Grove and American Fork, and the crop in these localities is far better than they expected to find it, they having seen a number of patches which would yield from 15 to 20 tons per acre, but course the general yield per acre will average much less than this. Mr. Austin stated that the farmers are utilizing all of the water they can get access to on their beets and orchards, and generally the water appears to be as good as in a great many more, more than was anticipated twenty days ago. Many of the farmers are greatly surprised at the progress the beets are making this season, considering the dry season in the higher mountain ranges, judging a field of beets from the tops, the tonnage apparently would be very light, but on investigation the beets are a very good size for this time of the season. The farmers are doing their utmost to take care of the beet crop, and Mr. Austin attributes the present favorable condition of the crop to the excellent cultivation it has received, together with the cool nights we are having. On Mapleton, Ben says Mr. Austin, in one patch of beets that has not as yet been irrigated and the beets are suffering but very little, which condition is due to the thorough cultivation they have received.

The beet crop in Provo appears to be as good this season at this date as it has ever been, particularly on the low lands. Ninety per cent of the Springville beets are looking well, and in the Mapleton district, notwithstanding the water in the higher lands, the beets look well. Lake View will also have a very fair crop as they are pretty well supplied with water from the Provo river, and while Pleasant Grove has not much water the outlook for beets is not at all discouraging. The American Fork beets look excellent especially when we take into consideration that this is practically their first season in the business.

IN SALT LAKE COUNTY.

In Salt Lake county the beets are looking well with the exception of a few acres in Lovendahl's, Riverton and West Jordan, and after talking with the Utah Sugar company, Ben says Mr. Austin, in one patch of beets that has not as yet been irrigated and the beets are suffering but very little, which condition is due to the thorough cultivation they have received.

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
