OUTLOOK FOR SUCAR BEETS

Conditions Most Gratifying Throughout Lehi Factory District.

Eighty Percent of the Crop of 7,558 Acres Looking Well-Cultivation in Line of Irrigation.

Special Correspondence.

Lehl, Utah County, July 30,-The beet sugar crop throughout Salt Lake and Utah counties as well as in the districts of Sanpete and Sevier is looking remarkably well considering the dry season. Manager Cutler and Superinintendent Austin returned late Saturday evening from a visit to the beet leids in the districts of Mapleton, Springville, Provo, Lake View, Pleasant Grove and American Fork, and the grop in these localities is far better than they expected to find it, they havcine will drive them away. ng seen a number of patches which vill yield from 15 to 20 tons per acre, out of course the general yield per acre vill average much less than this. Mr. Austin stated that the farmers are itilizing all of the water they can got access to on their beets and orchards. and generally speaking, they will be able to raise a fair tonnage, much more than was anticipated twenty days ago. Many of the farmers are greatly surmaking this season considering the drouth, as in a great many instances, judging a field of beets from the tops, the tonnage apparently would be very light, but on investigation the beets are a very good size for this time of the season. The farmers are doing their utmost to take care of the beet crop, and Mr. Austin attributes the present favorable condition of the crop to the excellent cultivation it has received, together with the cool nights we are hav-ing. On Mapleton bench, says Mr. Austin, there is one patch of beets that has not as yet been irrigated and the

beets are suffering but very little, which condition is due to the thorough cultivation they have received.

The beet crop in Provo appears to be as good this season at this date as it has ever been, particularly on the low lands. Ninety per cent of the Spring-ville beets are looking well, and in the Mapleton district, notwithstanding the water is very short, the beets look well. Lake View will also have a very late even as they are pretty well supwell. Lake View will also have a very fair crop as they are pretty well supplied with water from the Provo river, and while Pleasant Grove has not much water the outlook for beets is not at all discouraging. The American Fork beets look excellent especially when we take into consideration that this is practically their first season in the business.

IN SALT LAKE COUNTY. In Sait Lake county the beets are oking well with the exception of a w acres in Lovendahl's, Riverton and West Jordan, and after talking with the Utah Sugar Company's agents at Spanish Fork and Payson and the com-pany's representatives in Sanpete and Sevier counties, I find at this date eighty per cent of the entire beet crop is looking well, and the tonnage will far exceed the estimates of twenty or thirty days ago. The agent at Payson has just reported that the best crop in that locality is looking remarkably well, a number of fields will yield 20 tons per acre, while they have a few acres on the higher lands that will be light unless we have some rain soon,

SARATOGA RANCH.

The Saratoga ranch which was bough by the Utah Sugar company some time ago as a mother beet seed farm is proving to be an admirable place far this business. The five acres of mothers on this farm is how being harvested, which is turning out an enormous crop, and the person in charge of the cutting says the output charge of the cutting says the output in pounds will exceed anything he has yet cut or seen. The forty acres of heets also on this ranch is the finest crop in this section of the country which demonstrates that the manager of the Utah Sugar company made no mistake in buying this place for a beet sugar seed farm.
