# NURSERY TREES

So Says Inspector Sorenson in His Report to the County Board.

## THE PEAR BLIGHT IS SEVERE.

County Sur Must Report-Wash Young Loses His Franchise for Stringing Wires.

At the afternoon meeting of the county commissioners yesterday, the report of County Fruit Tree Inspector John P. Sorenson was received. The repor follows in full:

"I have to report that after inspecting several of the nurseries there is found some pear blister mite in some, red spider in others, and peach churl in others, all of which have to be treated before the tree is fit to deliver to anybody. There are also strong indications that some of the nursery stock may be afflicted with woolly aphis on the roots, which will require aphis on the roots, which will require treatment after trees are dug and before delivery. There are also signs of crown gall, which can only be determined after nursery stock is dug up, and, if found, must be condemned and destroyed by fire, as there is no cure for it. The digging of nursery stock will commence in about 14 days, or about the 12th of October, when it would be highly desirable that one assistant should be kept on as long as nursery stock is digging and delivered (or say until the ground freezes hard). He should especially look after the nurseries between Murray and Sandy, so I could give my full time to all the large nurseries in the vicinity of Salt Lake City.

"In regard to the pear blight it is severe in some localities and very light in others. The east bench from Mill Creek to Granite, and Granger on the west seems most affected. The ascreek to Granite, and Granger on the west seems most affected. The assistants report that through their work among the people several have been persuaded to enter fruit for exhibition who had not intended to do so, as the fruit crop is light this year, and several have promised to supply some fruit for general exhibition without trying for prizes if the assistant or sombeody would collect it and bring boxes for it. In this regard I would most respectfully request an appromost respectfully request an appro-priation of \$15 to cover expenses for gathering and displaying and for clean boxes for such fruits as are coming in for display which have to be re-packed."
