## The Late Storm.

Friday evening and evening witnessed the most disastrous snowstorms ever seen in Cache county. Nothing to equal it has ever occurred within the recollection of the pioneers or the valley. The snow fell in great drifts and continued rapidly and steadily until a late hour in the evening, when the rapidity of the fall lessened, but did not cease until morning. There was an interval of about two hours between the end of the snowfall and the onset of rain, and it rained so rapidly that twice that amount must have fallen during the afternoon. Early in the evening the snowdrifts were six feet high, but the snow had almost melted out of the drifts, leaving only a thin crust of snow on the ground, which was laid flat on the ground, and it failed, will be a total loss. The wheat crop, too, will be materially lessened. A little still remains in the shelter of the hills where it was cut, and this will be fit only for seed.

A severe frost Saturday night added to the damage in turn.
