## REFORM WAVE STIRS INTEREST

Mayor Brewer Called Upon by Ministers and Drink Dispensers.

COUNTY BOARD TAKES A HAND

Writes Strong Letter to City Council Suggesting Other Changes for Betterment of Local Conditions.

Ogden, March 3 .- The reform wave is stirring things up in Ogden. Mayor Brewer's action in closing the saloons on Sundays and at midnight meets with general approval. The Ministerial association yesterday called upon the mayor, commended his course and discussed other needed reforms, notably the closing of theaters and other places of amusement on Sundays.

The retail liquor dealers later called upon the mayor to protest against the reforms and to learn what was the policy of the present city administration. They were assured by the mayor that his stand was such that he would not revoke the orders that had been issued a few days ago regarding Sunday days losing. He also assumed the possued a few days ago regarding Suniay closing. He also assumed the poition that their other suggestions reparding the allowing of saloons to be
open after 12 o'clock at night during
the week, etc., would be considered.

The county commissioners seem also
to have become interested in the reform movement, as they sent in a comrehensive communication to the counis last evening respecting the better.

il last evening respecting the better-nent of the city and the need of con-erled action between the city and punty officers to attain that end. The county officers to attain that end. The commissioners call attention to the bowers of the council, among which is: The city has the power to suppress and prohibit bawdy houses, houses of it fame, assignation, lewdness, prositution, etc., etc." The other references are toward punishing and prosibiting selling or giving intoxicants a minors, insane persons and habitual minors, insane persons and habitual

hibiting selling or giving intoxicants to minors, insane persons and habitual drunkards, etc.

The commissioners hold that in directing the affairs of the city and county governments it sometimes is found difficult to determine where the duty of each commences and ends, and that this condition has caused unpleasant friction between the two governing bodies. Especial attention is called to the caring for the indigent peor which falls upon the county.

Attention is directed to the meeting of the board with the chief of police a week ago, which was held for the purpose of a more rigid enforcement of the state and city laws for the suppression of certain evils. A considerable portion of the letter is directed toward the habitual drunkards, who, it is charged, have been permitted to hang and loiter around saloons and opium dens until they have become so demoralized with alcoholic diseases and the debasing effects of morphine that the county has had to provide for their care and treatment.

The communication closes with the statement that the commissioners have instructed the county attorney and the sheriff to 185 their best efforts to locate and prosecute all cases such as are referred to.

The Ogden Waterworks company has decided to build a new, large reservoir for the conserving of water for domestic and culinary purposes. The plans and specifications are now being prepared for submission to the company officials, which if approved, work will be commenced on the reservoir at an early date. The site selected is a short distance north of the present site. The bottom and sides of the reservoir are to be all concrete, so that it can be easily cleaned. This is an improvement the waterworks company has long needed so as to increase the water supply.
