The papers in the case of John H. Lloyd vs. the Salt Lake City Street Railway company were also filed in the office of the Clerk of the Territorial Court this morning.

The plaintiff complained, and for cause of action alleged, that the defendant through the negligence, default and wantonness of the servants of the street railway company in Salt Lake City, on the 13th of March of the present year, caused the death of one John W. Lloyd, a citizen of the plaintiff.

On behalf of the plaintiff pray for \$50,000, damages with costs.

A Springville Dispute.

Three of the judges of the Supreme court—Chief Justice Zane and Justices Anderson and Miller—were engaged in a portion of this morning in hearing arguments of counsel in the case of the city of Springville, plaintiff and defendant (represented by Mr. King), vs. John S. Palmer, defendant and respondent, for whom Mr. J. W. N. Whitehouse appeared.

The real question to be determined was whether the appellant had any right of title to certain springs of water in and about Springville, and the case came on appeal from the decision of Judge Blackstone, granting a motion for injunction against the plaintiff, and the court of appeals affirmed the trial court's part of the judgment.

By continuing ditching and using the water on their lands for agriculture and other purposes these men took the water of the city. At no time did the owners of the water claim any portion of their rights of ownership and use of the water taken by them in 1882. It was further pointed out that the city authorities of Springville did not file a claim for a paper title to the water in question either from the original proprietors or from their successors in interest.

Judge Zane said the Territorial Supreme court would determine, before its adjournment, what action should be taken.
