Two Little Children Burned to Death at White Pine, Col.

LOST CHILDREN TO THE FORE.

Interesting Proposition from a Miner.—First Accident to a Day.—Another Disaster.

A committee of Denver lawyers has drafted a new divorce law which will be presented to the legislature. It will affect all the laws pertaining to the county court in Denver by throwing all divorce business into the district courts.

A scheme has been arranged to organize and incorporate a company to run the Palace Hotel at Logan. The capital stock is to be divided up and paid at \$5 per share. A considerable sum of the stock has already been subscribed.

H. M. Gorman, city clerk of Colorado Springs, has been discovered to be a swindler, having embezzled about \$10,000 of the city's funds. His salary is now only \$1,200 per year, and he began two years ago to take small sums. He invested a portion in Cripple Creek property. The scheme was discovered, and he received severe internal injuries.

The children, belonging to the seventh-grade Monday school at Logan, had to abandon their homes and times during the completion of the state Land Team Project. Instead of having a Christmas tree and the usual trimmings, the movement was spontaneous one on the part of the children, and surprised Superintendent Thorsen and his wife—Logan Journal.

E. W. Butler, a physician in the Crystal river country, has commenced suit in the district court at Aspen, Colo., against ORMAN H. MILLER, estimator on the 18th Mountain project for \$5000. The complainant alleges that on April 1st defendants without authority were blasting rock for the railroad grade, and that a large rock was blown through a window of a dwelling house, striking his wife and resulting fatally.

White Cloud, Foster of Colorado Springs, was visiting his friends in Cheyenne, last week, when a truck was taken from his wagon, the contents of which were worth \$100. It was supposed to have been taken by a dejected coal who passed through this country a few days ago, and the gain of himself and family indicated that several trunks of clothing would be acceptable.—*Cheyenne Daily Leader.*
