PROF. JOHN MILNE.

Prof. John Milne, whose seismic observatory at Shide, on the isle of Wight, tecorded a disturbance at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, English time, expresses the opinion that the earthquake had no connection whatever with the volcanic eruption.

THINKS VESUVIUS THE CAUSE. E. W. Munder, superintendent of the Greenwich observatory, on the contrary considers that in all probability it was a direct consequence of the activity of Mt. Vesuvius, whose eruption doubtless started a severe wave move through the crust of the earth. moveme H considers, however, that there is not sufficient reason to connect these catas. trophes with displays of solar activity, and comments on the comparative rarity of earthquakes in the United States Dr. Davison of Birmingham, anothe seismic expert obtained valuable re cords, but could suggest no connection between the Vesuvius and San Francisco disasters.

DOWIE SCORES FIRST VICTORY OVER VOLIVA.

Rockford, Ill., April 18.-Following the filing of a bill to set aside the conveyance of property in Zion City valued at \$21,000,000, Judge Wright of the circuit court today granted an injunc-tion restraining Wilbur G.
