Wired from Washington.

WASHINGTON, 11.-Recent dis-

patches on the part of the Commissioner

Loring of the Agricultural Department, had set up his

opposition towards the law providing

against the spread of pleuro-

pneumonia and kindred diseases of

cattle. The Commissioner, from the

time of the inception of the law,

was a most earnest and enthusiastic

advocate and supporter of it; and

was desirous that means might be

provided whereby diseases of cattle

might be examined into, and the

spreading of disease prevented,

through proper analyses and knowl-

edge of the subject. The Commis-

sioner has already established a

farm at Benning's Station, located

between this city and Baltimore,

which has been provided with all

the necessary accommodations and ac-

commodations to make a first class

cattle hospital, and these diseases

will undergo an examination and in-

quiry which he is confident will re-

sult in great good to the country.

The committee appointed to ex-

amine the condition of the Treasury

of the United States expected to

finish and report all the accounts to

the hand in about eight days. The

count of subsidiary silver coin closed

to-day. There remained to be

counted \$15,000,000 standard silver

dollars and \$33,000,000 legal tenders.

The committee are also engaged in

verifying the accounts of the office,

including the accounts of all dis-

bursed officers. No disbursements

thus far have been discovered in

either money or accounts.

The largest order for printing leg-

al forms ever given by the public

printer is that of the Commissioner

of Internal Revenue for blanks and

labels required to carry out the ef-

fect of the provisions of the law re-

lative to tobacco. The

order was for 50,000,000 labels and

750,000 blanks for the use of man-

ufacturers and dealers. There is a

great demand for these blanks, one

St. Louis manufacturer alone hav-

ing sent for 50,000 labels. The de-

mand is being filled as fast as cir-

cumstances will permit.

Gen. New, Assistant Secretary of

the Treasury, issued an order to-day

granting leave of absence on the

10th inst., to colored employees of

the Treasury who desire to partici-

pate in the emancipation celebra-

tion.

Judge Lilly to-day entered suit

against ex-Senator Dorsey for \$20,-

000 damages alleged to have been

sustained by him as the result of the

assault made upon him by Dorsey

at the house of the latter.

At a meeting of colored men held

this morning for the purpose of re-

marking the course of Black, the col-

ored messenger recently dismissed

from the Navy Department, one of

the speakers at the meeting was

ridge mine, owned by the Emmett

mining company, caved in Tuesday

afternoon at 1 P. M., burying nine

miners who were working on the

surface. The mine commenced

caving last Friday in the second

level, where about 250 tons fell in.

The danger was recognized by the

company at once, and all work be-

are Dick Williams, time keeper; Ed

son, John Morris, Thomas James,

Wm. Pollock, A. Helmer and Pat

Bean, all married men except Dick

Williams and Wm. Jeffrey. At five

o'clock cries were heard at the

mouth of the main shaft, and Ed

Wicks was finally found in the de-

bris down 100 feet, with a broken

rib and thigh. He spoke intelligently

on being taken out, but soon wan-

dered in his mind. The company

are unable to get at the other bod-

ies, and put up with a broken

machine as fast as men could

put them up. Three large, and one

small, bodies were also found up in

the awful pit. There is no hope

of the other men being alive. The

doctors have hopes of Wicks' re-

covery.

had died while asleep; but there

are circumstances connected with the

suspicion that he committed sui-

cide. He was one of the oldest re-

sidents of Doniphan county, and a

lawyer of high standing.
