EX-PRESIDENT ARTHUR'S

WILL.

Another Desperate Leap from

Brooklyn Bridge.

The Completion of the Coming

Congress.

By Telegram to the News.

Mr. Arthur's Will.

NEW YORK, 4.—The will of the late

Chester A. Arthur was offered for probate

to-day in the Court of Common

Pleas, special terms, before Judge

Bookstaver. This proceeding was

necessary on account of Surrogate

Rollins being one of the executors

named in the will. The three subscrib-

ing witnesses to the will made the cus-

tomary depositions as to the execution

of the will. There was no opposition,

but on account of the absence of Rollins

Bookstaver, special guardian for the late

Arthur, the proceeding was adjourned

until Monday. The following is a copy

of the will, which is a model of its

kind for its brevity and simplicity:

First—I direct my executors herein

named to pay all debts and funeral

expenses.

Second—I give and bequeath to my

faithful and devoted servant, Bridget

Smith, the sum of \$500.

Third—I give, devise and bequeath

all my estate, real and personal, to my

said executors or such of them as shall

qualify and take upon themselves the

execution of this, my will, and the sur-

vivor of them, to have and to hold

upon the following uses and trusts and

for the purposes following, to wit: I

trust, to divide my estate into two

equal parts or shares and to collect the

income, rents, issues and profits of

each of such shares, and after the pay-

ment of all legal and necessary expen-

ses to apply the income of one of such

shares to the use of my son, Chester

Allen Arthur until he shall attain the

age of thirty years, and when he shall

then, and in either of such events,

I give, devise and bequeath said share

to my said daughter, Ellen Arthur.

Fourth—I give and bequeath said share

to my said daughter, Ellen Arthur, and

in default of issue, to my said son,

Chester Allen Arthur.

Fifth—I give and bequeath said share

to my said daughter, Ellen Arthur, and

in default of issue, to my said son,

Chester Allen Arthur.

Sixth—I nominate, constitute and

appoint my said son, Chester Allen Ar-

thur, guardian of the person and estate

of my said daughter, Ellen Arthur, and

my friends Charles W. Smith, John G.

Hollins and B. French, all of the

City of New York, executors of this,

my last will and testament, hereby

revoking all former and other wills by

me at any time made.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto

set my hand and seal this eighth day

of March, 1886.

Ant-Societies League.

CHICAGO, 4.—A meeting held in

this city this afternoon to set on foot a

movement to counteract the influence

of Socialists and their teachings the

name "Anti-Social League" was elected

and president, Colonel W. W. Jackson,

treasurer, and Thomas M. Nichols,

secretary. An Executive Committee

composed of Messrs. Jackson, Nichols,

and the following platform

and declaration of principles and pur-

poses were adopted:

PLATFORM.

Any person may become a member of

this League by signing the platform

setting forth its principles and pur-

poses.

Any person contributing money to

this League shall be entitled to receive

its publications to the full amount of

money contributed.

The primary object of this League

shall be:

First—To support and defend the

Government, the Constitution, laws

and institutions of the United States,

National, State and municipal, as ad-

ministered through the three necessary

and well defined departments—legisla-

tive, executive and judicial—and to

furnish a channel through which the

order-loving and peace-loving people

of the country can at all times ex-

press itself and make its convictions

and strength known.

Second—To oppose Anarchism, So-

cialism, Communism, Moral Reform

and Despotism of all kinds, and all kindred

social and political heresies that tend

to destroy the peace of society, the au-

thority of the Government, the sacred-

ness of the law, the rights of property,

the liberty of the citizen, and the

sacredness of the family; and to

serve due notice on Anarchists,

Socialists, Communists, Moral Reform

"isms," that human liberty, as repre-

sented and practiced by American free

institutions, has cost too much and is

too valuable and sacred to allow it to
