A Peculiar Document.—Elder Benjamin L. Boyett and other brethren laboring as missionaries in the State of Alabama, have been served with copies of the following unique document:

APPLE GROVE, Ala., March 25, 1882.

At a regular meeting of the Applegrove Grangers held March 25, 1882, on motion of Brother W. J. Russell, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we as a Grange and representing the public sentiment of this community, detect the movement of certain men belonging to the so-called Latter-day Saints, in their efforts to obtain permission to preach in the churches of this community, and we hold in utter abhorrence the baneful doctrines and practices they propose to teach and instill into the minds of our sons and daughters and to disseminate in the country.

Resolved, That we hold the doctrines of these people to be utterly at variance to the teachings of Christ and to every principle of the Christian religion, virtue, good morals, as good government, and as subversive of the whole fabric of good society and true civilization.

Resolved, That the doctrines and teachings of this people, especially upon the subject of plural marriage, is contrary to the common sense of every truly civilized country and opposed to the laws of our State and these United States, and therefore we are not willing they should remain and teach among us.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to prepare and present to parties a copy of these resolutions, and respectfully request these Mormon Elders who are intruding themselves and their vicious and devilish doctrines upon this community to desist from so doing; and further, to leave this community immediately, never to return.

Resolved, That Brother A. M. Nabors, P. P. McAnally and A. R. Wilson be requested to deliver a copy of the above resolutions to the said so-called Mormon Elders at as early a day as possible.

Resolved, That the secretary of this Grange be directed to furnish a copy of the above resolutions to each of our county papers and to the Editors of the Standard of Columbus, Mississippi, and request the publication of the same.

"We are now enjoying some of the early productions of spring, such as onions, radishes, etc. We had little or no winter here. It has not been very cold, and there has not been much rain. From the way the Gila River is swollen there must have been a great fall of snow in our day school has a week's vacation. This spring term there were 85 pupils enrolled, with an average attendance of 75. (Sabbath) baptismal services were attended to, at which there were present 180 persons. There were 17 persons baptized into the Church—nine children and eight adults.

We anticipate having our town canal now in course of construction completed by the middle or last of May. Our grain thus far looks well. Freight is in good demand here, which is more or less a drawback to the upbuilding of our place, as it draws the settlers from home work, but we are beginning to get our eyes open on that point by observing the progress of those who stick to the farm. Flour, grain, vegetables, etc., demand very high prices, such as the following: Flour, \$5.75 @ \$6.00 per 100 lbs; beans, \$7.00 @ 8.00; onions, 10c. per lb.; potatoes, \$7.00 @ \$8.00, and everything else in proportion."
