

INTERNATIONAL YACHT RACES.

Negotiations Pending for Series Between Germany and United States.

AMERICANS TAKE INITIATIVE.

Plan is to Have Three Boats Sail for Each Country to Determine General Excellence.

New York, Aug. 3.—Negotiations are pending, it is announced, for international yacht races between the United States and Germany. They have been informally undertaken by a coterie of American yachtsmen, principally eastern racing men, and are being carried on with members of the Imperial yacht club at Kiel. The German emperor is understood to have manifested a keen interest in the proposal, and while he has not as yet indicated his entire approval of the plan, it is disposed to favor it. If satisfactory conditions can be formulated, it is practically certain that the races will be arranged.

The idea is not for contests of ninety yachts, but to widen the interest by giving more opportunity to racing men to actively participate in the sport and to make the contests for boats that are of sturdy type and not mere racing machines.

The racing length of the contestants is now a matter of negotiation. The Americans favor the 33 raters which are popular among German clubs, and the Germans generally have been met with approval.

The plan is to have three boats sail for each country and the races are determined by the general excellence of the three. If this idea meets with the enthusiasm expected, it is proposed to arrange for one race, but to make the contest either an annual or a biennial event to be alternately on this and the other side of the water.

ATHLETIC CONTESTS.

All-around Championship Won by Freisell of Mulmohar.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 2.—The Lewis and Clark all-around individual national championship games today were won by Freisell of the Mulmohar Amateur A. C. of this city, with a total score of 1,000 over V. C. of the Olympic club, San Francisco, who made 3,000 points. E. E. Parry of the Chicago A. C., 1,000, and D. O. Sullivan of Anacosta, Mont., whose score was 1,000. Parry, in the hammer throw event, broke the world record for a throw of 135 feet 4 inches. The record was 134 feet. Summary:

Freisell, winner of the individual championship games at Portland, is well known here to the followers of college athletics. Freisell was a member of the Nevada track team three years ago and was imported from Pennsylvania to defeat the university team. He was successful in doing it and won 33 points for his team. In the high and low hurdles, the 120-yard dash, high and broad jump, he was first place. He also entered the relay race and outran his man by ten yards.

Reconstruction of the Manhattan Terminal Has Begun.

New York, Aug. 3.—Efforts to reconstruct the Manhattan terminal of Brooklyn bridge for the purpose of relieving in part the crush which has long made travel during the rush hours a menace to life and limb, began yesterday. By October 1 it is expected that the improvements will be completed and the congestion in traffic stopped.

Temporary relief only is expected from the present reconstruction. Work on a \$5,000,000 terminal recently authorized by the city authorities will begin next year and will require a considerable time for completion. The platforms will be greatly expanded and changes will be made enabling the Brooklyn elevated trains to cross the bridge at all times, thus doing away with the terrible scramble to board bridge trains.
