

late Judge Elias Smith, passed from mortality at her home in this city Friday morning at the age of 75 years.

The deceased was a most estimable and widely respected woman, who passed the greatest portion of her life in Utah, sharing in the sorrows and triumphs of the people. Death was due to strangulated hernia, for which the deceased underwent a surgical operation on Saturday last. The case was a severe one, and she never rallied sufficiently to give hopes of permanent recovery. She was the mother of four children, three of whom are now living. She was born at Dunton, Bedfordshire, England, January 4, 1821.

OGDEN, Utah, April 6.—William Winslow of Winslow ranch, while driving down Ogden canyon, opposite the upper camp of the power dam, was thrown or fell from a wagon loaded with timber, the wagon passing over the body from shoulder to hip. The team ran a few yards down the canyon going over a bank twelve feet high into the river. The wagon was smashed and the horses were washed down the stream a short distance. Foreman L. C. Jarvis saw the accident and sent a company of men down from the work. The injured man was brought down to the city. It is thought that he cannot live more than a few hours.

Judge Street decided the Third precinct councilmanic contest in favor of B. T. Lloyd and against William Elliott.

The contest arose in this way: Lloyd was appointed successor to the late Councilman Watson but was ousted by the majority members of the Council in favor of Elliott whereupon Lloyd instituted proceedings to have Elliott ejected. The latter through his attorney, John M. Zane, demurred to this. Some weeks ago the demurrer was argued and the case taken under advisement, and today's ruling was the result.

Elliott was given five days to answer. It is hinted, however, that there will be neither answer nor appeal, in which case Lloyd will of course soon take his seat.

A call for the subscription of money to liquidate association indebtedness resulted in the raising of \$1,778.
