LOCAL BRIEFS.

Delegates Homeward Bound—The Salt Lake delegates to the Masonic convention at Nashville will return Thursday evening.

To Talk Salesmanship—John D. Spencer will speak on salesmanship next Thursday evening at the meeting of the Manufacturers' association in the Chamber of Commerce.

James Likes Salt Lake—C. A. Jones, a retired capitalist of Keene, N. H., says that Salt Lake is not only one of the most beautiful cities that he has seen, but is also one of the most progressive.

Antelope Island Favored—The annual report of the American Bison society, just published, refers to Antelope island as the ideal buffalo park in the country, and says the buffalo there are the best specimens of the bison now extant.

Lucerne Mergot Active—The Lucerne mergot is reported as doing extensive damage in this section of the state, stripping the plant of its leaves, and ruining entire fields. Many farmers are cutting their alfalfa and burning it. Vegetation is backward in many places on account of the late spring.

Methodist Church Dedicated—The new Methodist church of Milford was dedicated Sunday last by Rev. Dr. J. H. Talbot, superintendent of the Methodist work in this state. The church is named after the late Rev. J. M. Crowell, who for 25 years was secretary of the American Sunday School union.

Z. C. M. L. Excursion—The employees of Z. C. M. L. will indulge in an excursion to Panguitch in Ogden Canyon next Saturday. The tickets including railroad fare, street car fare, auto in canyon, trout dinner and dance. A special train will leave the Bamberger depot at 3 p. m. The tickets being good on any returning train.

Heavy Damage to Peaches—The damage to the peach crop in Weber county is reported more severe than was at first reported. In many places not over 10 per cent of the normal yield will be realized. Secretary Taylor of the State Horticultural society is considering plans for raising the temperature in orchards during frosty seasons.

Plat Iron Turns Incendary—An electric fault on a line of the Northern Ironing board with the current turned on, started a small fire at the residence of J. W. Hawley, 238 Colfax avenue, yesterday afternoon. The fire department was called to extinguish it. The heated iron had burned through the board and ignited the floor before the blaze was discovered.

Squires Improves Slowly—Insurance Commissioner Col. George B. Squires is still confined to his room, but slightly improved this morning. He is said to be far from the condition in which his friends would like to see him.

Funeral Held in Lansing—The supreme court will meet Thursday noon to receive from the bar resolutions of respect and condolence on Judge Henderson's death. The body was sent to Lansing, Mich., for interment, where the funeral was largely attended. Members of the Utah, Knights Templar, and Masonic lodges turned out to show their respect to their former fellow townsman.

May Deport Italian—Francis Rossi the Italian who has been telling all sorts of strange stories to the police showing an unbalanced mind, finally has declared that he is a deserter from the Italian army. This has brought him to the notice of United States Immigration inspectors L. J. De Hart, who is considering his case with the view of deporting him. He is being held by the police pending the decision of Inspector De Hart.

Funeral of Sarah Allgood—The body of Mrs. Sarah Ann Allgood, who died in this city on Saturday, was sent to Covalville today for interment. Mrs. Allgood was born in Sheepshead, Leicestershire, England, Dec. 19, 1846. She was married to W. H. Allgood in 1866 and came to Utah the same year. She lived in Covalville until five years ago, when she came to this city. She is survived by six of her 12 children. They are: Mrs. Jane Hancock of Park City, Mrs. Stewart of Theodore, Mrs. Gertrude Berg, Mrs. Estelle Waters and Florence and Clara Allgood, all of Salt Lake. She was a faithful member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

GIRL'S LIFE SAVED BY JOHN F. OLSON

Falling Headlong Into the Lake, He Dives to Her Rescue—Child Falls From Train.

The heroism of John F. Olson of Hooper, Utah, last night saved the life of Miss Florence Taylor of 442 West Fourth South street, when, after she had jostled off the pier at Saltair into the lake, he plunged into the water and rescued her.

The accident occurred while the usual late home-seeking crowd was boarding the 11 o'clock train from the beach. Miss Taylor had boarded an open car and was seating herself on the outer side when several thoughtless, scrambling passengers plunged into the same seat jostled her, their force being sufficient to throw her off the car, and over the narrow space of the platform into the lake. Olsen, a passenger on the same car, witnessed the plunge of the girl, and she had barely struck the water before he made his dive after her.

When he reached the side of the girl she was becoming straggled, and but for his prompt aid would have succumbed. Olsen managed to bring the girl to the pier, where ready hands pulled the couple out of the water. Aside from the nervous shock, Miss Taylor suffered no injury and by the time the city was reached, was able to laugh over the incident. The girl's father, John Taylor, who lives at 442 West Fourth South street, was fortunately of a slight nature and consisted of bruises.
