Young Tozer performed the greatest pitching stunt of the season, for the Pacific National league, yesterday afternoon. He shut out the Babies with only four hits and two bases. The score was four to a cipher.

He struck out three men. He kept his head all the time, and never lost his speed and cunning for a moment. It was a revelation to the fans, and demonstrated that Tozer has the goods to deliver. If he works constantly he will make one of the greatest pitchers in this neck of the woods.

The support behind him was all that could be asked for. True, there was an error on the part of Wood, but the speedy third baseman more than atoned for it by doing some of the most brilliant fielding seen here for quite a spell. In the second he made one of the most difficult catches of a foul fly from Hoult. The ball went so high it looked about the size of an egg. When it began to descend it came with a sort of corker movement. But Wood was there. There was another one in the fourth from Flannery's bat. It went high, deep and fast, but Wood made a lightning sprint and got under it to the shame and disgrace of all Flannery.

Bruyette was also in the game all the time, and performed some remarkable stunts. In the fifth, a high, swift one was batted toward him. He was seen to jump high and his left arm shot out like lightning. The ball struck and another upstart went the way of all flesh. Bruyette, Delmas and Clark pulled off a spectacular double play. Hausen, behind the bat, gave Tozer the best support the youngster ever had in his life, and that is saying a great deal. In fact, the entire team played National league ball all the way of the game.
