

I then went to the court martial. Gen. Lucas was presiding. After some discussion, Lucas announced that Joseph Smith was found guilty of treason against the Government, and was sentenced to be shot on the public square of Far West at 8 o'clock the next morning.

General Doniphan, who was a witness of the trial, said, "Gentlemen, your proceedings are as illegal as hell, and if the decision of this court is executed it will be a cold-blooded murder; and neither I nor my brigade will stay here to witness it. Joseph Smith is a civilian, and not subject to court martial in any way; and if he was who is your court composed of? One half of them are a set of G—d—d priests and are not military men under any circumstances whatever, and have no right to sit on a court martial."

After this I returned to Far West, and then to my home.

SPRINGVILLE, June 1, 1868.

Editor Deseret News:—The brethren of Springville have been at war with the locusts, which have been hatching, from time to time, in vast numbers in the Springville Big Field. Three days last week were devoted to burning, driving into holes, and into a large ditch dug by the brethren as a sepulchre for the "varmint." This ditch was dug to intercept the insects, which were invariably journeying northward in the direction of the great portion of the crops of this vicinity. Many bushels found their last resting place in their "last ditch" on Thursday, and I am informed that since that time the destruction has been very great. The cañon east is alive with the "hoppers," which are often found piled on each other several inches in depth.

In addition to the labors to prevent the ravages of the locusts, Hobbie Creek has kept the brethren busy in protecting its banks from washing. The street north of the Public Square has been protected by laying brush and piling large rocks upon it. The lot below, containing the residence of Father Parish, was with great effort saved. A breaker containing many tons of trees, brush, rock and earth, was constructed about half across the stream, which changed the direction of the current. The creek has commenced doing damage to Bro. Storrs', east of the Public Square, having washed out several large apple trees yesterday.

You will, no doubt, be pleased to learn that some sisters here have commenced braiding and making their own straw hats. One of them remarked to me, a few days ago, that she knew no reason why the ladies of Utah were not as capable of creating their own fashions as those of Paris. That sister is sensible, certainly.

Editor Deseret Evening News:—Dear Sir:—A circumstance happened yesterday, which created a feeling of indignation here. As two of Bro. Lot Smith's boys, about eight or ten years old, were coming down from Weber, both riding the same horse and driving a cow, the stage overtook them on a dugway in Weber Canyon; and without giving them a chance to get out of the way, the driver suffered the stage to strike the horse, which knocked it into the river. One boy jumped off in time to save himself, but the other remained on the horse, which swam the river, but could not find a landing on the other side. The boy, however, got off and let the horse swim back, and then traveled on foot along the other side of the river to the mouth of the canyon, a distance of two or three miles. The stage driver still went on, until some of the passengers jumped from the coach, saw the one boy safe on the other side, and brought the other down to the station.

The water was not very swift where this happened, or both horse and rider would have gone down stream. Such outrages as this should come to the notice of the Company, or we may have to record something with a less happy termination.

With the exception of this incident, nothing disturbs the quietude of our town. The farmers think they will still raise a crop, in spite of the "grasshoppers," which are "bad" in places. Good health generally prevails.
