#### FIRST CONTRACT. What is Contemplated by the Benver, Northwestern and Pacific.

The news told in the dispatches yes terday afternoon of the commencement of construction on towards Salt Lake City by the Denver, Northwest & Pacific was an auspicious opening of the New Year for Utah.

While the work immediately contem-plated is only for the first 36 miles of grading on the Moffat road, nevertheless the promise is forthcoming that other contracts will be let just as soon as the surveys can be finished.

The work which started yesterday was commenced at the end of the grade already completed by the Denver & Northwestern 14 miles out of Denver, and represents the contract which was let on Dec. 18, aggregating about \$2,-000,000. This contract was made in five divisions, the first three, 13½ miles, going to Orman & Crook of Pueblo, and the fourth and fifth divisions, 16½ miles, going to George S. Good & Co., Lockhaven. Pa. It is anticipated that work will give employment to

about 4,000 men. The work undertaken is exceptionally heavy and embraces no less than 25 tunnels, the shortest being 150 feet and the longest 1,700 feet. The maximum grade will be 2 per cent, and the maximum curvature 8 per cent. The line will be as direct as possible, and in or-der to accomplish this hills will be bored through and deep cuts made rather than follow a circuituos route in

the avoiding of them.

When finished the line will approxi mately be 500 miles in length between Denver and Salt Lake. This will mean that if two trains pull out of Denver at the same time for Salt Lake, one on the D. & R. G., and the other on the Mof-fat road, and provided they maintain the same speed throughout per mile traversed that the passengers on the Moffat line will be pulling into Salt Lake about the time the other train is crossing the Utah-Colorado line.

It will also mean that the trip from
Denver to Salt Lake can be accomplished in a day. That is, the train will leave one end of the line at about 8 o'clock in the morning and arrive at the
