L. Frank Baum, the author of "Ozma of Oz," "The Land of Oz," "John Dough and the Cherub," and half a dozen other charming children's books, is really the creator of a new era in such publications. It was he and his publishers who first produced a children's book printed in the many colors which are now so common, and his books are instantaneous. The following year no less than 12 other such publishers also produced varicolored children's books, and the third year there were 22. In the mechanical production of "Ozma of Oz," Baum's latest book, which has just been published, the Reilly & Britton company has outdone even its own best efforts in the matter of drawing for the illustrations of Mr. Baum's delightful nonsense.

An interesting fact has just come to light in connection with the publication by Messrs. J. B. Lippincott & Alexander Macdonald's "In Search of El Dorado." It appears that Mr. Macdonald, who is a geologist and mineralogist, was one of the first to go to the Klondike, and among the men in charge of the dog sledges was Jack London, author of "The Call of the Wild." In a sense, the origin of that author's work is to be traced to his experiences under Mr. Macdonald.

Temple Bailey, the author of "Judy," one of the ten new books for the young on Little, Brown & Co.'s fall list, is the daughter of a union soldier but educated in a private school in Richmond which emphasized old world ideals. She has written a short story, "A Star for故乡," winning the second prize in the "Ladies Home Journal" love story contest four years ago. Vivid remembrances of her happy girlhood days made possible many chapters of "Judy," the longest story for girls she has written. Miss Bailey now makes her home in Washington, D. C.

Before the revival of the drama in French, by the rise of the romantic school, Louisiana produced "Pauline," which illustrates of time, place, and action were well observed. of the mammalia, the principal species their geographical distribution, and their relative economic importance. Many notes and incidents from personal experience are introduced. The scenes of the story is laid in New York and the female interest with which it is filled is worked out with unusual skill. Marion Hill has another of herimitable stories, called "Tuckahoe Hollow," for the Society of American Indians, which is told in all of which we much above the average. Arthur Stringer has a short story full of dramatic interest, which he calls "The Guardian at the Gates." Another story which will make a deep impression is "Cassation Way" it is by Kate Jordan, whose short stories are always nearly perfect of their kind. Marion Hill's "The Return of the First" is a story which is a refresher change from the stereotyped love-story, and possesses, besides, a profound human interest which will keep the reader's attention concentrated from first to last. A special feature is another of Guy Norton's unique winter stories, called "Packer Jim's Goodwill." Mr. Norton writes well, and knowledge of the great west, as no other author has shown to a similar degree, and there is in this, as in everything he writes, a genuine human element which makes all his work so touching. Rafaello Salvatini has an exciting tale in "The Fortunes of War." Eugene Wood contributes an entertaining article on "The Chapter on Love."

Thirty-one new books are announced by C. C. McClurg & Company for publication during the present autumn, of which only four are new novels and romances. These, however, include Randall Parrish's "Beth Nervell," in which contemporary life is dealt with by that popular author; Mrs. Katharine Tyman's "For Malee," a love story of aristocratic England; Charles H. Aldrich's "The Crimson Thread," a cold romance; a son about Pizarro's overthrow of the Incas in Peru, and Miss Edith Huntington Mason's "The Real Agatha," in which a nice fellow finds a nice girl, but not until he has been bewildered by several other nice girls. In addition four volumes of the "Prairie Classics" will be brought out late in October, new and compact editions of "Duskwood," "Collected Tales" and "A Tale of Two Cities," and of Scott's "Kenilworth" and "Ivanhoe."

Three new books are announced by Little, Brown & Co., the pocket edition of the standard Worley translation of "The Comedia Humana de Balzac" which Little, Brown & Co. prints for the sake of national pride, and will interest readers in both north and south. The author has added studies those elements in the belongings of the republic that developed and made inevitable the late friction and disruption culminating in the civil war, shows the strength and weakness of conflicting sectional interests in national life, and finally pictures the welding of these interests into the promise of a united nation.

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
