

AN INHUMAN FATHER AND MOTHER

They Leave Their Four Children In an Empty Cabin in the Mountains.

NEARLY STARVED TO DEATH.

Did Not Dare to Venture Forth as Leg Hurt Was Watched by a Mountain Lion.

Katipell, Mont., May 8.—A sad case of four children deserted by their parents in the woods near here and the little ones' escape from a mountain lion has been brought to the attention of State Humane Officer Schoenfeld.

The children, the oldest of whom is 15 years and the youngest eight months, were left by their parents in an empty cabin in the mountains. They were found by a woman named Atkinson, so weak from want of food that they could scarcely walk.

They said a huge mountain lion had been watching the cabin for days and they were afraid to venture out.

Mrs. Atkinson led the children to town and the five were followed four miles by the lion. The children are now in charge of the humane officer.

KAISER WILHELM PRAISES JAPANESE FOR PATRIOTISM.

Berlin, May 8.—The Evangelische Kirchen Zeitung today prints a detailed report of Emperor William's remarks when speaking to the naval recruits at Wilhelmshaven on March 9. According to the very brief reports published at the time, he cited the Japanese as a luminous example of patriotism and soldierly fidelity. The paper's resume of the speech is as follows:

"The emperor referred to the heroic deeds of the Japanese and added that these are born of Japanese patriotism and love for children, which in turn resulted in splendid discipline in the army and navy. One must not, however, draw the conclusion from Japanese victories—victories of a heathen over a Christian people—that Buddha is superior to our Lord Christ."

"The Japanese could show many Christian virtues. A good Christian makes a good soldier. Among the German people, too, Christianity is in a sad condition and he doubted whether we Germans in case of war would have the right to pray God for victory, to force it from him like Jacob wrestling with the angel. The Japanese are the scourge of God, like Attila and Napoleon. It devolves upon us to take care that God does not chastise us some day with such a scourge."

Japanese Flagship Lost.

London, May 8.—The correspondent of the Times telegraphs from Paris that the Japanese flagship Mikasa was lost in the straits of Korea a week ago.

Golf Admitted to Bail.

Milwaukee, May 8.—Henry D. Golf, the former assistant cashier of the First National bank, charged with the embezzlement of more than \$100,000 from the bank, was admitted to bail tonight in the sum of \$10,000. Golf's case comes up for preliminary hearing on May 19.

Drew Succeeds Jefferson.

New York, May 8.—The board of directors of the Players' club has elected John Drew president of the club, to succeed the late Joseph Jefferson.

JAPANESE EMIGRATION.

Tokio Government Issues Order Prohibiting It to Hawaii.

Honolulu, May 8.—The steamer Siberia, which arrived today from the Orient, did not bring any Japanese passengers other than 17 women, who are joining their husbands. The Japanese press contains statements that the Japanese government has issued an order prohibiting the further emigration of laborers to Hawaii.

JAPANESE WARSHIPS Sighted Between Hongkong and Amoy.

Amoy, China, May 8.—Vessels arriving here report having sighted Japanese warships between this port and Hongkong. Japanese ships appear off Amoy at night and undoubtedly are in communication through this line with the island of Formosa.

SHEPHERD RUNS AMUCK.

Slashed Passenger With a Knife And Was Shot and Killed.

Boise, Ida., May 8.—Special to Statesman from Bellevue says: An unknown man, said to be a shepherd, ran amuck on the Wood River branch train today and after slashing the throat of one of the passengers with a knife was shot and instantly killed by Constable William Schaffer who was on the train. The train was run back to Bellevue and the dead man and his victim were taken off. The injured man is named Moore. He is connected with the Salt Lake headquarters of Collier the Eastern publisher. His recovery is doubtful. So far the dead man has not been identified.

MRS. MAYBRICK.

British Government Will Not Grant Her a Complete Pardon.

Washington, May 8.—Ambassador Choate has cabled the state department that the British foreign office has refused to grant any further clemency to Mrs. Florence Maybrick, who recently made application through the state department for a complete pardon.

It appears that Mrs. Maybrick was not granted a complete pardon, but was released from imprisonment upon certain conditions and she is still technically under sentence.

Borax King's New Plan.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 8.—The Times says that Frank Smith, the "Borax King," who it was reported some time ago, was making a survey for a new railroad into the mining districts of Nevada, has changed his plans and will build a road from Las Vegas, Nev., touching the new Salt Lake line at that point, westward and southwardward into Bullfrog district, on one branch and Death Valley borax mines on the other.

Gen. Davis Leaves Panama.

Panama, May 8.—Gen. Davis, the retiring governor, in accordance with the orders of Secy. Taft will leave Panama tonight for Colon, on his way to New York. Col. Gorgas, the new sanitary officer of the canal zone, will take charge of the zone tomorrow.

Mining Concession in Korea.

Washington, May 8.—Minister Allen, in a telegram to the state department, says that among valuable mining concessions granted by the Korean government was one to the American firm of Colborn & Boswick.

Peasants Fire Prince's Property.

St. Petersburg, May 8.—The peasants have fired the property of Prince Liza areff at Kherson. A strong force of dragoons has been dispatched to Kherson.

Japs Have a Knife Duel.

Vancouver, B. C., May 8.—As a result of a duel with knives among Japanese at the Balmoral cannery on the Skeena river, several charges of murder, or at least attempted murder, will probably be made. When the steamer bringing the news to Vancouver left the Skeena, the results of the duel

received by four participants was uncertain. The provincial police have several of the duellists under arrest.

IMPORTANT DECISION ON USE OF QUOTATIONS

Washington, May 8.—The supreme court of the United States today decided the case of the board of trade of Chicago against C. C. Christie Commission company of Kansas City and the Kinsey company of Chicago, involving the question as to the right of the plaintiffs to use the continuous quotations of the board, in favor of the contents of the board of trade.

There were two cases in which the point was raised, one of them being entitled "The Board of Trade vs. The Christie Commission Company of Kansas City," and the other "The Kinsey Company of Chicago vs. The Board of Trade," but the questions were identical. The board of trade and both involved efforts to enjoin the private establishments from the use of the board's quotations.

Justice Holmes, in delivering the opinion of the court, related that the board's quotations under a contract not to deliver them to bucket shops, a majority of the cases were instituted to prevent the use of the figures by private houses without contracts with the board of trade. He added that although the court was not prepared to say that the transactions of the board constitute gambling and the decision was that the injunction should be granted as prayed for.

Justices Harlan, Brewer and Day dissented.

In his opinion Justice Holmes characterized the board as "a great market maker where through its 1,500 members, is transacted a large part of the grain and provision business of the world."

"People will endeavor to forecast the future and to make agreements according to this kind of competition," he said, "and the adjustment of society to the probable future is well known as a means of avoiding or mitigating losses, equalizing prices and providing for periods of want."

"When the Chicago board was organized we cannot doubt that it was expected to afford a market for future sales as well as present sales, with the necessary incidents of such a market, and while the state of Illinois allows the charter to stand, we cannot believe that the state, merely as a means of future sales are made, are forbidden by law."

EQUITABLE AFFAIRS.

Directors Hold a Conference at Which They Are Considered.

New York, May 8.—The conference of Equitable directors, called to consider the financial condition of the company, was held last night at the Hotel Hamilton. The directors present, including the following: Louis Fitzgerald, Chauncey M. Depew, H. C. Deming, George H. Squires, Charles S. Smith, M. E. M. E. Ingalls, E. H. Hartman, Jacob H. Schiff, C. B. Alexander, M. Hartley Dodge, J. E. Donavaro, Bradish Johnson, August Belmont, Jr., D. O. May, J. Gould, Thomas T. Eckert, Alvin W. Kreeh, John J. McKee, H. M. Alexander, David H. Moffat and Joseph T. Low.

The conference was called to order by Mr. Schiff, who said that he was not alone responsible for the meeting, but the directors had spoken to him of the necessity of meeting and also of conferring on the present situation and conditions in the society.

It was decided that it would be unwise for any director to make any statement before the report of the investigating committee. The only affirmative action taken was that the board should be called together not later than the 31st of the month.

The statement is made that no demand was made at the conference today for the retirement of any director. Alexander or Vice President Hyde. It was not denied that the names of several men of distinction were mentioned in connection with the presidency of the society.

Superintendent of Insurance Hendricks today made public a statement that the Equitable society is financially sound and that all its contracts to policyholders are fully and safely guaranteed.

A suggestion by implication was made during the conference, when M. E. Ingalls, after a speech in which he told of the necessity for a speedy settlement of the difficulty, urged for the society an executive committee of men of business experience and reputation.

"We must get a man of the size and ability of Grover Cleveland," said he, "if we want to get out of this Equitable of its present predicament."

Unknown Man Suicides.

Columbus, Mont., May 8.—Word was received here today from a bridge camp a few miles from this place that an unknown man committed suicide there yesterday morning.

The man had been in the vicinity of the camp several days and had been acting queerly. Yesterday morning he walked over the bridge and jumped off the Volavato river and jumped off. The body was recovered but has not been identified.

Capt. J. E. Hansen Drowned.

San Francisco, May 9.—News has been received here that Capt. J. E. Hansen, a well known ship master on the coast, has been drowned by falling overboard from the steamer Santa Ana, en route from Seattle to Sitka. For many years Capt. Hansen was in command of the Alaska Commercial company's steamers sailing out of this port.

Trolley Cars Collide.

Thirty Persons Injured, One of Whom Will Die.

New York, May 9.—In a head on collision between two trolley cars on the island 30 persons have been injured. Mrs. Dora Davidson of New York probably will die.

Both cars were well filled with passengers when they came together. The platforms of the cars were battered to splinters and many of the passengers were injured.

CHINESE MERCHANTS

In New York Are Organizing Commercial Association.

New York, May 8.—With the sanction and help of the imperial government, the Chinese merchants of New York are organizing the commercial association to which every Chinese merchant or property holder will be eligible.

It is said the idea was originated by former Minister Wu Ting Fang, who, since his return to China, has taken great interest in the commercial relations between his countrymen in China and those in the United States. He is in favor, it is understood, of forming a great association, with branches in every large American city, to further commercial relations between the two countries. The objects of the organization will include efforts to prevent certain abuses of the exclusion laws and customs regulations, which the Chinese consider unjust.
