Big Increase Noted in the Output of

Copper Last Year.

Charles Kirchhoff, special agen-e United States geological surof the United States geological sur-vey, has computed the quantity and value of the copper, lead, and spetter produced in the United States during 1994. He has in preparation detailed reports of these industries, which will be published in the Survey's forth-coming volume "Mineral Resources of the United States, 1994." A very considerable increase took A very considerable increase tool

A very considerable increase took place in the production of copper dur-ing 1004. The production amounted to 812,537,267 pounds, valued at \$105,-629,845. The production for 1003 was 698,644,517 pounds. The most noteothy increase occurred in Arizon are both the Bisbee and Globe ditricts added largely to the product. The imports in one and matte amounted to 38.947.772 pounds: the imports in bars, ingots and eld bars to 142,344,432 pounds. The exports of copper amounted to 564,544,880 pounds, a hotocable increase over the exportation of 1903, which was only 329.322,627 pounds.
