# REAL MISSION OF THE TEACHER

The Subject of an Interesting Sermon by Rev S. A. Haworth.

## ON THE MORALS IN SCHOOLS.

Says it is a Rank Injustice to Boys and Girls to Exclude Bibles From Public Schools.

Rev. S. A. Haworth of the East Side Baptist church preached yesterday on the real mission of the teacher, and argued for the teaching of morals in the schools. Mr. Haworth's text was from Dan. xii: 3, "And they that be teachers shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness, as the stars forever and forever."

He said in part: "This is the greatest compliment to the teaching profession in all literature. The real mission of the teacher is to turn many to righteousness, denied our public school teachers. The people of this country have swung from one extreme to another. For fear of fostering the union of church and state we place limitations on the schools in fostering good morals. We have said that the Ten Commandments shall not be taught in our public schools. The Bible, that great fountain of morality, is excluded from us. This is a rank injustice to the multitude of boys and girls who are without moral instruction in their homes and who cannot be reached by the Sunday schools owing to the indifference of their parents. If not their own fault, to the work of the churches and Sunday schools.

FIRST PREREQUISITE.—"The first prerequisite to good citizenship is good morals. The controller of the currency of the United States in a recent interview at Washington admitted that there is no possibility of absolutely protecting bank stockholders and depositors when integrity is lacking on the part of the bank officials. It ought, therefore, to be the duty of the teacher to give some time to instructing the pupil in the common principles of honesty and morality as contained in the ten commandments.

"A judge in a certain western state recently rendered a decision against allowing the principles of morality taught in the public schools lest the rights of the atheist be infringed upon. I say it is wrong to deprive the boy of a knowledge of ethics for the sake of some atheist and then imprison the boy who through ignorance breaks the law by theft or murder. It is not a square deal. The same logic if consistently carried out will put a stop to our teaching physiology or that the breaking of a bone involves pain or the teaching of the laws of health in order to avoid disease, because if we teach these things we will be infringing upon the rights of the Christian Scientist whose fundamental religious tenet is the denial of the existence of matter and of pain. We will have to repeal all laws requiring the teaching of the effects of alcohol on the system, for fear of trespassing upon the right of some old top who worships the god, Bacchus. Scientific temperance instruction will have to be banished from the schools of our country if we are going to follow the logic of this extreme view.

MUST OBEY NATURE'S LAWS.—"We are in a world where if we do not obey nature's laws we suffer. If we do not keep away from the fire we burn. Moral laws are as inexorable as are the physical laws of life. He who breaks the moral laws is locked up in prison. We pay many millions of dollars to our police forces of this country to lock people up who break the laws of the land. It would therefore seem wise to remove the restrictions imposed upon the public schools and encourage the teaching of the universal principles of Christian ethics revealed in the Ten Commandments and in the sermon on the mount. If the state assumes the right to put a youth in jail it ought to have the right to teach him how to keep out of jail.

"President Roosevelt in a recent address declared that a man educated in the intellect only is a most dangerous citizen, and that the highest citizenship can only spring from the education of the moral nature alongside of the intellectual. This being true it is time for the reintroduction of a course of instruction in our schools giving to the youth of our land a knowledge which is necessary for the strengthening of the moral fiber of our republic."
