Philosophy on Fattening Hogs.

The philosophy of the increase of fat in animals, says a scientific writer, is, that the digested food not needed to supply the waste in the system is laid up in the form of fat around the muscles, ready to be absorbed again in the circulation if needed. Waste is induced by exercise, or use of the muscles, and also by combustion in the lungs, of the digested food, to supply animal heat. It follows, therefore, as a logical conclusion, that the same amount of food given in warm weather will, if digested, afford a greater surplus of fat than when fed in cold weather.

We hold to the principle that, here, as elsewhere, hogs should be fattened early in the season and that breeds should be selected with this in view, that is, as we have before stated, having the elements in them of early maturity. Thus, instead of keeping hogs all winter—which is a great additional expense without deriving a fair equivalent in increase of pork, as is clearly shown above—we would commence fattening in September and kill as soon as the cold weather comes.

There are very many items that are worthy of notice in the fattening of hogs. Pens are by some recommended, so small that the animal will have but just room to stand or lie. While confinement favors rest and a disposition to fatten, too close quarters are not healthful for the animal, which needs moderate exercise to promote digestion. The quality of the flesh produced must be somewhat impaired by any confinement that interferes with the health.

The appetite may be kept up during the summer season by change of food, a frequent supply of green vegetables, such as corn, cabbage leaves, pea-vines, and the refuse of the garden.

Cooked food digests much more easily than raw, and is in a condition to yield more nourishment, and is also better relished by most kinds of stock.

Cleanliness in the fattening pens should not be overlooked. Although pigs proverbially are filthy, they are not really so; they do not delight in the effluvia of their droppings, as any one can see by noticing that they generally appropriate one portion of the pen to filth.

An occasional washing and scrubbing with soap suds will conduce much to their thrift—all animals keep in condition more easily when the skin is kept clean and healthy.

A hog fed by Mr. G. D. Watt, of this city, killed a few days since and on exhibition at Jennings' meat market, weighed 455 pounds. He was a very fine hog, but not quite so large as two hogs raised at Parowan in 1858. The treatment above indicated, we learned from conversation with Mr. Watt, was similar, in most respects, to that pursued by him. This hog was of the best breed he could find; was kept in a clean, dry place; fed with cooked or scalded food, etc.

HAS THE EARTH A RING.—The venerable Humboldt, from observations recently made, respecting the zodiacal light, draws the conclusion that the earth is surrounded with a nebulous ring lying without in the orbit of the moon! This startling conclusion is drawn from the fact that the zodiacal light has been seen simultaneously at both east and west horizons. It is rather odd if we have been for ages playing the part of a smaller Saturn among our brother and sister planets without knowing it!
