New York, Oct. 15.-Final solution of an interesting historical problem in con-nection with the approaching fludson-Fulton celebration, has been reported to the celebration commission by Rear Ad-miral Joseph B. Coughian, U. S. N. of the naval parade committee final plans for the construction of a fac-simile of Robert Fulton's first success-ful steamboat on the Hudson river, the Clermont, the one hundredth anniversary of the history-making voyage of which, and the three hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the Hudson river by Henry Hudson, are to be jointly cele-brated on the Hudson next Sentember. The plans for the steamboat Clermont's reconstruction were worked out after prolonged historical research. Singular y enough the naval committee had greater difficulty in determining ne ap-pearance of the Clermont, which was built in 1807, than in fix-ing the appearance of Henry Hudson's Half Moon, which en-tered the river in 1609, 200 years carlier. Contemporary draftings of both the Clermont and the Half Moon age want-ing, but the latter vessel's lines are clearly established by historic descrip-tions and Illustrations of spins known to be of her type, whereas the Cler-mont, being a ploneer vessel, was not one of a type and no aid could be drawn from descriptions or cuts of contemporary trasfingle without question.
