## GREATER ODDS ON THE ELECTION

Betting During New York Municipal Campaign Enlivened by Lengthening of Offers.

New York, Oct. 22.—Betting on the local election has been enlivened by the lengthening of the odds and the offering for more and larger wagers. Gaynor, who was the big favorite, was not quoted at 2 to 1 with several large odds at these odds reported placed in Wall street. Fred H. Brooks, a broker, who for many years has been a leading betting commissioner in Wall street, announced that a stock exchange firm had offered to place with him \$10,000 to be wagered at 2 to 1 that the result of the election would be:

Gaynor, first; Hearst, second, and Barnard, third.

Joe Daniels, well-known on upper Broadway, said that \$10,000 had been placed with him to be wagered against \$2,000 that Hearst would not win.

## NOTHING DOING FOR JACK JOHNSON

Los Angeles, Oct. 22.—Promoter T. J. McCay has received word from Jack Johnson that the big negro, conqueror of James J. Jeffries and others, wants to box in this city before he goes east.

After naming financial terms that are both reasonable and satisfactory, Johnson said:

"I would like to show before my Los Angeles friends now that I am a champion. I will come south in my automobile immediately if you can give me a date inside of the month. I depend on two weeks. I will meet any man in the wide world you may select. This certainly gives you a large enough field to pick from."

The almost hopeless condition of the heavyweight division was brought straight home to McCay when he tried the lighter weight for his Johnson-Johnson. McCay's only hope of parading Johnson's prowess in Los Angeles is to get the champion to agree to stop two hours earlier than the regular time. ## HOOKWORM AMONG FOOTBALL PLAYERS

Athens, Ga., Oct. 22.—The prevalence of the hookworm, which certain scientists have ascribed as the cause of lameness among the students of the University of Georgia, is causing the faculty alarm, and a campaign has been determined upon to eradicate the parasite.

Dr. J. C. Bloomfield, president of the city board of health, has been examining the students at the request of the faculty, and he reports that at least 30 per cent are suffering from the hookworm. Many examined, Dr. Bloomfield states, are members of wealthy families, and his immediate directions is that the disease is prevalent only among the poorer classes.

Some members of the university football team, and the physicians say the hookworm undoubtedly is responsible for the poor showing the team is making, as one effect of the parasite is extreme physical sluggishness.

Since Dr. Bloomfield's report, the faculty has been looking into the matter, and it is believed that the affected and in every case it is lower than those free from the hookworm.
