We have the river water running in our new canal within a quarter of a mile of this city. Hence the enterprise is very successful.

Each man works at his trade, and, so far as I can see, i is progressing beyond my expecta tion. Hence, here is a good place for men to settle who believe in uniting themselves together as neignbors and friends. The Order has got in about 600 acres of small grain, and it certainly looks better and more promising this year than ever saw it. Everybody is very busy; we have but few drones in the hive here, if any; each one seems to work to the interest of each other, and it is very desirous that such a state of things should continue and prosper.

As the subject of appointing new watermaster for the city is under consideration, the old official having resigned, it might not be amiss to suggest that the office is a very important one, and the importance of it is increasing.
