EASTERN.

Fatal Boiler Explosion.
COLUMBUS, O. 5.—The explosion of a locomotive at Delaware, on the C. C. & I. C. Railroad, to-day, injured the engineer, Wm. Hutchinson, and killed his son, the acting fireman.

Mills to be Closed.
PITTSBURGH, 5.—Owing to a disagreement in a convention, between the iron puddlers and manufacturers, to-day, all the mills excepting two or three will suspend work on Monday; the manufacturers decided to reduce the rate from six to five dollars per ton for puddling, which reduction the workmen refused to accept.

MONTGOMERY, 5.—The State Senate has ousted Miller, a republican, and seated Martin, a democrat.

Cringers Adjourned.

ST. LOUIS, 5.—The executive committee of the Missouri State Grange, which has been in session here for several days past, adjourned to-day, without having done considerable business. They adopted a resolution favoring open trade between the Mississippi Valley and Brazil, a bill for steam ship lines, and asking the farmers of the valley to aid in supporting the enterprise; they say it is their duty and policy to induce shipment by river southward instead of by rail eastward.

An Illegal Grand Jury.

WAASINNOKY, 5.—A full bench of judges in this district, to-day, directed that the late grand jury, which indicted the two men in glasses, was illegally chosen, and therefore all the indictments by that grand jury are nullities.

The matter came up on the case of Huff, found guilty of stealing a horse and carriage from the Continental Hotel in this city; his counsel appealed, and the case has been decided against the legality of the grand jury.

Suit Commenced.
ST. PAUL, 5.—Attorney General Wilson, to-day, commenced a civil suit on behalf of the State in the second district court, against the State auditor Charles McMath for the recovery of ninety-four thousand dollars, alleged by the State to have been wrongfully withheld by McMath during his term of office, extending over a period of twelve years. The suit was commenced on the 1st of October, and the amount of collections from stampage and interest on certain Missouri State bonds, Hon. Wm. Lochner, the recent democratic candidate for associate justice of the supreme court, is associated with the Attorney General in the prosecution of the suit.

FOREIGN.

FRANCE.
Death in the Assembly.
PARIS, 5.—The National Assembly has been engaged in an exciting debate for two days on a bill supported by clerical leaders for freeing the universities from the control of the state. The principal speakers were the Bishop Dupanloup, legitimist, and Chamelier Lacour, a radical deputy for the Bouches du Rhone. Bishop Dupanloup, in the course of his remarks, may, accidentally, uttered the dangerous words to society to be apprehended from the friends of those who favored the shooting of the Archbishop of Paris. The remark occasioned a great tumult in the chamber. Upon the restoration of order, Chamelier Lacour retorted upon the Deputation in a speech of great bitterness. In the course of his speech he referred to several personalities to the judgment of honest men and those who had some regard left for the dignity of the French episcopate. Upon the conclusion of the debate the bill passed by a second reading by a vote of 553 against 133.
