W. H. Parent Captured at Denver And Will be Brought to Salt Lake.

FIGURED IN M'WHIRTER CASE.

Second Principal in the Famous \$10,-000 Robbery Now in Hauds Of the Law.

Denver, Feb, 15 .--- W. H. Parent, one of five men alleged to have swindled Alexander and William McWhirter of Salt Lake City out of approximately \$10,000 in cash, was arrested here this evening by Deputy Sheriff Leonard Delue. The arrest was the result of a peculiar incident. Sheriff C. F. Emery of Salt Lake City and Joseph C. Sharp, chief of his criminal department, came to Denver on business wholly foreign to the McWhirter case. Casu-

foreign to the McWhirter case. Casu-ally they related the story of the memorable game to Delue. "I know that fellow," said Delue, when Farent was described, "and I will get him." Inside of an hour Delue had Farent and the latter had been identified. Sheriff Emery at once wired Gov. Cut-ler to rush regulsition papers. Farent will make a fight. He admits his identity. With Parent's arrest, three of the quintet are at large now. They are the two O'Briens, and Bell, also known as Sinclair. Parent is in the county jail, where

also known as Sinclair. Parent is in the county jail, where he will be held until requisition pa-pers arrive. He is about 26 years of age and so far as is known has been comployed since he arrived here. Sheriff Emery said tonight that there could be no question that Parent is the man wanted. It is not bedeved that the other rugitives are in Denver.

that the other fugitives are in Denver. This is the second of the men con-nected with the McWhirter robbery to be apprehended and placed under ar-rest, Jim Donaldson being the other one. The two O'Brien brothers and the man who went by the name of Bell have so far eluded the minions of the law. That all will finally be cal-ed to account for the perpetration of the boldest robbery in the history of salt Lake, is confidently expected by Sheriff Emery and his deputies. — Parent is the man who impersonat-ed an officer and who, assuming the name of Davis, took from Alexan-der McWhirter upwards of \$8,000, after others of the hold-up game had buncoed the Scotchman out of more than 22,000. The bogus officer, who had displayed a star, upon entering arrest, but so worked the game that the two McWhirters were the only ouse that did not escape. The money taken was to be returned at the police station, and a receipt therefor was swhere, and through the alleged con-niving of certain police officers, the stationers gat but \$1,000 of their uncey.
