SENATE.

Adjourned Sine Die.

WASHINGTON, 24.—At five p. m.,

while the Senate was still in ex-

ecution of its business, a message

was appointed to wait upon the

President to inform him that, un-

less he had further business to con-

sult, the Senate was ready to ad-

journd without day. Resolutions

of thanks to the President pro

tem, Ferry, and vice President

Wilson were passed by a vote of

yeas and nays, and adopted unani-

mously, and at 6.30 the committee

appointed to wait on the President

reported that the President had

called upon the resolution offered

him on Monday for final adjourn-

ment, and moved to fill the blanks

by inserting 5.45 p. m. March 24,

which was agreed to and the resolu-

tion was adopted. The President

pro tem, Ferry, and vice Presi-

dent Wilson were then called upon

for the courtesy shows him, and

EASTERN.

Wool.

BOSTON, 24.—The market re-

mains unchanged. The price of

wool continues to rule low and

without improvement. Medium

grades are still very dull. In fact

desirable lots of wool are difficult

to find. Sales have been made to a fair

extent, and include fine and medium

grades of New Zealand, Scotch and

Swedish fleeces at 52 1/2 to 53 1/2

cents; Michigan and Wisconsin at

49 1/2 to 50 1/2 cents; and delaine

at 45 to 46 cents. Super and X

grades have been in demand, and

range from 40 to 50 per pound; and

desirable lots of wool are difficult

to find. Sales have been made to a

fair extent, and include fine and

medium grades of New Zealand,

Scotch and Swedish fleeces at 52 1/2

Intense Ice Gorge.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., 24.—There is

no change in the ice of the Ram-

apo gorge anchor. The ice has

accumulated at the north end

of the lake, making it nearly

twenty miles in length. At Tun-

hunk the river is open, while at Pit-

tston it is frozen so solid that hun-

dreds of people come to-day. At

the former place the current is

swift, while at Pittston the water

is still dammed up by the Wilkes-

barre gorge. The Tunhunk

bridge has had a narrow escape,

one of the piers having been badly

shattered. The ice breakers are all

turned out to break the big ice

of ice comes down it is feared that

the structure must go. The Wilkes-

barre company have had nearly

two days strengthening the

piers and abutments of their bridge

by iron and other means. The

Delaware and Hudson Company,

which owns the bridge, has a com-

pany of men at the bridge, and a

plan for blasting the foot of the

gorge.
