

ZEMSTVOIST CONGRESS OPENS

President Had Just Started to Speak when the Chief of Police Suddenly Appeared.

BEGAN TAKING DOWN NAMES

Then Cries Were Raised of "Write Down the Whole of Russia."

Moscow, July 19.—The zemstvo congress opened at midday today in the residence of Prince Dolgoroukoff. The congress was attended by 225 delegates, Count Heyden, leader of the opposition representing the congress recently received by the emperor, presided.

M. Colovins, president of the organizing committee, had barely started a statement dealing with the obstacles placed in the way of the congress, announcing that Gov. Gen. Kosloff had promised that there would be no recourse to extreme measures, when the chief of police, with numerous commissaries and officials, entered the room.

The chief announced that the prefect had prohibited the meeting of the congress and ordered the seizure of the documents. Count Heyden protested against the proceeding, but the chief of police began taking the names of the delegates. Then cries were raised of "Write down the whole of Russia!"

Many persons present who were not delegates to the congress requested that their names also be taken. The police then departed in order to draw up summonses and the signing was resumed.

The scheme of a national assembly, on the basis outlined by the committee presided over by M. Boulgan, minister of the interior, was minutely and critically discussed and denounced as totally inadequate to remove Russia's internal evils, because including a property qualification and an electoral system by classes, preventing the assembly from truly interpreting the will of the nation, while the exclusion of numerous categories of citizens from the franchise would contravene the principles of equity and reasonable state policy.

At the same time it was recognized that the proposed assembly would comprise a considerable portion of the social forces of the empire and serve as the center of a social movement which would tend to secure political liberty and regular national representation. Therefore, it was considered desirable that in the event of the carrying out of the Boulgan or a similar project, the delegates of the zemstvo and municipal bodies should participate in the assembly to the greatest possible extent, with the object of forming a compact group and to obtain a guarantee of individual and public liberties.

Numerous resolutions embodying the foregoing criticisms were adopted unanimously, as were also resolutions complaining of excessive administrative and police control of elections, and insisting that publicity be given to the proceedings of the proposed assembly, which should be in direct relations with the emperor, without interference from the council of the empire.

STABBED TO DEATH.

Brothers-in-Law Had Been on Bad Terms for Months.

Stockton, Cal., July 19.—Albino Casillas, a miner, who had been employed at the Melrose mine in Calaveras county, stabbed to death his brother-in-law, Bruno Arata, late yesterday afternoon. The town men had been on bad terms for several months. They met in a saloon at Moravia and got into a fight. Casillas was knocked down, whereupon he drew a candlestick, made of steel and very sharp, and stabbed Arata twice in the left breast and three times on the right side. He then made good his escape, after which he took his wife to the home of Thomas Martinez, another brother-in-law, and, leaving her there, started in the direction of Stockton, his purpose being, so he said, to reach the Mexican border at the first opportunity.

IDAHO TIMBER FRAUDS.

Names of Those Indicted Not Yet Divulged.

Boise, Ida., July 19.—No official announcement has yet been made of the complete list of persons indicted at the recent session of the special United States grand jury at which a number of indictments were found for timber frauds in the Lewiston district. VICE GOV. OF FINLAND.

Attempt Made to Assassinate Deutchroch.

Helsingfors, July 19.—Late this afternoon, two hours before Karl Leonard Hohenthal had been sentenced to imprisonment for life of hard labor for the assassination of Procurator Gen. Rönönn-Soininen on Feb. 6 last, an attempt was made to assassinate Vice Gov. Deutchroch as he was leaving the senate.

The vice governor had walked across the square when suddenly as he neared the police master's office, a bullet from the curb threw a mob from a distance of 50 paces. The bomb fell short, but the vice governor was blown off his feet by the concussion of the explosion, which shattered the windows in the neighborhood for a distance of hundreds of yards.

Vice Gov. Deutchroch was hastily assisted to the police station. He was burned and otherwise injured about the legs, and blood profusely, but his wounds are declared not to be fatal. The bomb was believed to be thrown by naval cadets, but escaped.

WANTS HER RIGHTS.

Mrs. Esther Stichtenoeth Wants Receiver Appointed.

Chicago, July 19.—Mrs. Esther Stichtenoeth of Cincinnati filed today in the United States circuit court a bill asking that a receiver be appointed for the Central Stock & Grain company of Chicago, the Central Stock & Grain exchange of Hammond, Ind., and the Hammond National Bank of Hammond, Ind. Judge Bequaert of the court appointed, in response to the bill, the Equitable Trust company as receiver for the assets of the two grain exchanges and of other property of Richmond Mellic, who is the chief stockholder and practical owner of the concerns mentioned.

Recently Mrs. Stichtenoeth obtained a decree for something over \$1,000 upon the showing that her money had been used in speculation in a "bucket shop," her husband, it was alleged, by Mrs. Stichtenoeth that Mellic moved to Indiana, with the consequence that no levy could be made on the property of the alleged "bucket shop" concern, and she was unable to obtain any portion of \$500,000 said to be held by a national bank of this city for Mellic.

The bank was also named in the bill, it being alleged that the officers of the bank be enjoined from transferring the money. The restraining order against the bank was issued at the same time as the appointment of the receiver was declared.

The various companies named in the court proceedings and controlled by Mellic are the largest of their kind in the United States, having a leased wire system that covers nearly every state in the middle west.

GEN. JOSE MIGUEL GOMEZ

Charged with Causing Difficulties For Cuban Government.

Havana, July 19.—Gen. Jose Miguel Gomez, the Cuban commander in chief, is charged with causing various difficulties for the government in the province of Santa Clara of which he is governor. A commission sent by the interior department to inspect the municipal affairs of the town of Vuelta has been prevented from doing so by the alcalde and a squad of rural guards has been sent to the scene to enforce the carrying out of the government order. Gen. Gomez, it is alleged, has been to an undue extent granting his followers the privilege of carrying arms, and it is said that this matter will be investigated.

Gen. O. O. Ashton Drops Dead.

Seattle, Wash., July 19.—Gen. Oliver O. Ashton, of Boston, dropped dead in the Hotel Washington in this city about 6 o'clock this afternoon from a stroke of apoplexy, brought on by the heat.

General Ashton, accompanied by his wife, arrived in this city on Wednesday from a trip to Alaska. They spent the last winter at Los Angeles, and came from there to Seattle to make the northern trip.

He had just returned from a drive and had been sitting in the lobby of the hotel for a few minutes when the seizure occurred.

Only One Convict at Large.

Tacoma, Wash., July 19.—A special to the News from Kalama, Wash., states that George Wade, the only one of the eight convicts from McNeil's island uncaptured, was rowed across the Columbia river from St. Helena, Ore., last night by a man named J. Matthews, who states that Wade drew a rifle on him and obliged him to obey his commands. Wade was put ashore near Caples. He is a well-known murderer, and he was in search of a calf to kill. During the supposed convict's absence, Matthews escaped. Sheriff Kirby has a posse in pursuit.

Attempted Train Wreck.

Portland, Ore., July 19.—An unsuccessful attempt was made shortly after midnight this morning to wreck the northbound Northern Pacific train known as the "Pain City express" at a point two miles west of Seaside, Ore., by placing a steel rail weighing 750 pounds across the track.

At the point where the attempt was made the track has a slight down grade parallel with the river. The engineer of the train saw the obstruction in time to slow down the train, but the force of impact when the cow catcher struck it was sufficient, nevertheless, to bend the rail into the shape of a horseshoe. The rail was carried for about 100 yards before the train was brought to a dead stop.

Jim disappeared Monday. The trail indicated that he had been dragged 50 feet from the point on the bank of the Stillaguamish, where it is believed he had been sitting when he was shot from behind.

Invincible fighters, but their record in the present war is utterly destructive of their old time reputation for bravery. It does not seem, either, that they have distinguished themselves as scouts. The Russians have on all occasions been grossly ignorant of the enemy's position. Much of this force has been recruited from the empire's eastern tribes. The Cossacks in the picture are more like Chinamen than Russians proper.

Commons Pass Alien Bill.

London, July 19.—In the house of commons today the alien bill passed its third reading by a majority of 50. Premier Balfour, in winding up the debate on the bill, contended that the proposed restrictions were less severe than those imposed by any other nation. He referred to the American immigration laws and asked whether any one would assert that the Americans were indifferent to freedom or looked with unmoved eye on the suffering and oppressed, yet their restrictions, as well as the restrictions imposed by the British colonies, were, he said, more severe than those imposed by "this moderate and reasonable bill."

Wife Beater Whipped.

Portland, Ore., July 19.—Clem Bieker, a wife-beater, was today subjected to 19 lashes under the recently enacted law providing for the whipping of wife-beaters. Bieker tried his best to be brave, but the last few blows from the whip caused him to cry out in agony.

Engineer P. Bronsdonda Dead.

San Francisco, Cal., July 19.—Phineas Bronsdonda, perhaps the most prominent pioneer constructing engineer of the coast, has died at his residence in this city at the age of 73 years. He came to San Francisco in 1848, after finishing his first engineering work, the construction of the public gardens of Boston and the first horse car line over

POSTUM

HUSBAND SUES WIFE FOR MONEY

Nathaniel Gibbs Ingraham Wants Her to Pay Him Fifty-five Hundred Dollars a Year.

AGREED TO BEFORE MARRIAGE.

She Declares That He Induced Her, By Various Devices, to Get Divorced From Her Husband.

Birmingham, July 19.—Singular documents were submitted today in the suit of Nathaniel Gibbs Ingraham, formerly of New York, against his wife, formerly Edith Newcomb Ward, now pending before the court of sessions here.

Mr. Ingraham asks that his wife be ordered to carry out their ante-nuptial settlement, under which he claims he is entitled to \$1,500 a year and also a claim of \$4,000 per year by virtue of a bond granted in his favor. The wife contends that the contract and bond were obtained by fraud. She alleges that after her separation from her first husband, Reginald H. Ward, the plaintiff induced her by various insidious devices, like fortune telling, to institute divorce proceedings against Ward and also induced her husband to consent to the proceedings. They Mr. and Mrs. Ward were divorced in 1903, and Mrs. Ward then married Ingraham. Before the marriage Mrs. Ward says she was taken to a lawyer's office and was induced to sign an ante-nuptial settlement contract without reading the papers or knowing what they contained. The plaintiff says the defendant procured marriage to him first and he declined, but afterwards consented to please her as she was in poor health.

Mrs. Ward was Miss Edith Newcomb of Kentucky, daughter of H. Victor Newcomb, at one time an important factor in Wall street. Reginald H. Ward, who was known in London as Count Ward, was at one time Roman Catholic consul there. At one period of his career Ward was known as the "Copper King." He is a Bostonian by birth. The Wards were married in New York on Nov. 25, 1899, and were divorced here May 25, 1903. Mr. Ingraham is a grandson of Justice Ingraham of the supreme court of the City of New York. Mr. and Mrs. Ingraham were married Sept. 22, 1903, in London.
