Take, for instance, the selling of any kind of merchandise, including intoxicants. If there is no law forbidding or regulating that traffic the mere business itself is not criminal. But a law may be enacted requiring those engaged therein to pay a certain license fee and constituting the sale of certain articles without a license a punish

able offence. The act which is not criminal in itself is then made criminal by law. It is the same with many offences for which people committing them may be made to suffer penalties; without a legal enactment they would be inoffen.

No Warm Currents in the Facility New YORK, 6 .- Dr. Thomas An-

New YORK, 6.—Dr. Thomas An-tisdel, who lectured on the Pacific Ocean last evening, says the *Times*, proved to the satisfaction of geo-graphers present, that there are no warm currents in the Pacific like the Gulf Stream of the Atlantic. The only regularly defined warm current is one extending from the Equator northward along the Asia-tic shore, where it loses itself in the cold current from the north. This current exists only in warm weath-er, and is due mainly to the mon-soons.
