DOING STUNTS

Foster Had to Hang From Clothes Locker, Stand on Head, Eat Under Table.

SOME MIDSHIPMEN INVOLVED.

Several Declined to Testify on the Ground That They Might Incriminate Themselves.

Annapolis, Md., Jan. 4 .- Today's proreedings before the court-martial which is trying Midshipman Worth W. Foster of New Albany, Ind., for the alleged hazing of Midshipman Chester Roberts, were of interest, as not only were some new forms of hazing explained, but the number of witnesses who sought to be excused from answerng questions on the ground that they would incriminate themselves indicates now thoroughly the practise of hazing has permeated the institution.

The court ruled that a midshipman did not incriminate himself if he did not actually take part in it himself, but even after this explanation several midsven after this expianation several mid-shipmen asked to be excused from an-wering questions, saying they would incriminate themselves if they as-twered. The record of yesterday's pro-ceedings in Decatur's case was verified and some small changes made in the record of Midshipman Coffin's trial. The court then took up the case of Midshipman Foster. ishipman Foster.

Midshipman Foster.
It is alleged that between the middle of October and December Foster hazed Roberts by compelling him to stand on his head, to hang from the clothes tocker and eat under the table. Mr. Theall, Foster's counsel, objected to the indifferent nature of the time alleged for the commission of the acts. He sa d that he was not able to properly prepare a defense when the time was so uncera defense when the time was so uncer-lain and asked that the judge advocate be compelled to specify more exactly. The court was cleared to consider his

The court was cleared to consider his request.

Foster pleaded not guilty to the charge and all the specifications.

Midshipman Chester S. Roberts was the first witness. He identified the accused by name. He appeared most relucant to testify against the accused and parried the question of the judge advocate until Capt. Rees, the 'president of the court, cautioned him that he was under oath to tell the whole truth in the matter. He then said that about two weeks after the school had opened Foster had ordered him to report to Foster's room and he had done so. Foster had ordered him to go in the small room and that some one had then held his thumb in four positions, these indicating, he said, he he was in succession to tell his name, where he was from, whom he succeeded in the academy, and to get on his head.

He was compelled then to do "Number 16" and then to hang on the locker, both of which he did. He then was asked if he could do any better at the table. The witness answered that he

both of which he did. He then was asked if he could do any better at the table. The witness answered that he had done his best before and was then ordered to hang on the locker again. Roberts said that Foster then sent him for Midshipman Clevenger. Foster and Decatur were in the room, he said, and

Midshipman William R. Mannier of the second class was the next witness. 'ounsel asked that the witness be cautioned that he need not give testimony which would incriminate himself. He was then asked if he had seen Roberts sent under the table at any time and in reply, asked if, in answering this ques-tion in the affirmative he would be in-criminating himself by admitting being criminating himself by admitting being present when the hazing was going on and not reporting it. The court ruled that his mere presence would not incriminate the witness. He then said that Roberts had been put under the table, by Mr. Foster, he thought.

Midshipman C. R. Hyatt, William L. Beck and Paul H. Rice, who followed on the stand, gave testimony corroborating Mannier.

ating Mannier. that he had heard Koberts ordered un-der the table by Foster. This was the first witness before Roberts who said directly that Foster had given the order to get under the table. Lieut. Commander S. T. P. Magruder, aide to Supt. Sands, and who has charge

of the prepartion of the charges and specifications upon which midshipmen are tried before the court-martial, said are tried before the court-martial, said this afternoon that the only charge which had been prepared up to this time except those already tried was one sgainst Midshipman S. P. B. Marzoni. "However," he said, "there will be charges in a new case ready for the court as soon as it has disposed of the previous one and I cannot say when the end will come."

In all the cases tried so far the harge has been framed under the act of 1874, under which active participa-tion in hazing must be proved. In fu-ture cases the charges will be framed under the amendment to the law ap-proved March 3, 1993. The words of this act make it an offense, punishable to dismissal "to participate in, encourage

or countenance hazing."

A printed form for the charge under the act of 1903 has been made out by order of the superintendent and there are indications of a wholesale use of

SPANISH IN PHILIPPINES.

It Will Continue to be Official Language There for Next Seven Years.

Washington, Jan. 4.—Acting Gov. Ide has cabled from Yanila that upon the unanimous recommendation of the Consolidated Bar association the commission has extended for seven years the period of time during which the Spanish language might be used officially in the Philippine courts.

Chicago, Jan. 5.—The Record-Herald today says:

An ambition cherished for many years by the Roman Catholic church dignitaries of Chicago, is a plan by which this diocese becomes the center of the best Catholic education and religion in America, finally has assumed definite shape. With the opening in the suburb of Austin of an immense seminary for the priesthood, plans of which have just been completed, the first step towards the realization of the great project will have been completed.

Gradually other edifices dedicated to religious purposes will be added to the seminary, and it will become the strongest Catholic ecclesiastical school in the country. Eventually a cathedral will

est Catholic ecclesiastical school in the country. Eventually a cathedrai will foin the other buildings and the spot will also become the official center of the religious work of the diocese. The idea of the cathedral, which has only been roughly penciled on paper, outlines a structure which will be one of the most imposing church edifices of the century.

Improvements already have been started on the property. No definite idea can be given of the final amount to be expended on the church work, but it probably will not be less than \$5,000,000.
