WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, 26.—The Chair stated

that the unfinished business was

the resolution to discharge White

and Randall immediately on the

adjournment of the present session.

Pending an amendment of Davis, of Ky,

Carpenter said he had nothing to do

It is reported that the Secretary of

the Treasury is deliberating over the

proposal and will probably accept it, as it

is an immediate market for about

\$130,000,000 more of the new loan.

RUTLAND, 26.—The lumber mills of

R. M. White & Co., in Mendon, were

destroyed by fire to-day; loss, forty

thousand dollars. About one thousand

acres of land have been burned also, and

the fire is still raging.

A fire at Vergennes to-day destroyed

Ray, home's building shop, the furni-

ture establishment of Holland, Max-

field & Cloos, a plaster building be-

longing to N. G. Norton, the residence

RICHMOND, 26.—The city election re-

turns were canvassed this morning and

showed that the Conservatives have car-

ried the city by 170 majority and elect-

ed 26 out of 30 councilmen. Two of

the Conservative councilmen were

re-elected for also by Republicans. In

been completed. In Norfolk the Con-
