Washington, Feb. 6.—The president today made public a letter urging upon Congress a modification of the law against hazing at the naval academy. Unless Congress shall promptly amend the existing law against hazing, which makes mandatory the dismissal of any midshipman found guilty of any form of hazing, the secretary of the navy may be forced to dismiss 33 midshipmen from the naval academy within the next month, in addition to the eight who have already suffered this penalty. "With my present information I should report against this particular kind of wrestling. I do not think the Japanese method is in any way preferable to ours. A man is more apt to be injured or abused. I think it is a trick, a ruse, a temptation there is to injure an adversary, and I do not think that intentional injury is the spirit of sport."

Admiral Sands said the instructions in boxing have nothing to do with any predisposition to fighting at the academy, and that hereafter there will be no fist fights at Annapolis. Members of the committee asked Admiral Sands many questions about the Japanese method, who is being snubbed by other midshipmen. Admiral Sands said the young men treat each other politely in the official relations, and he is powerless to reach other results. Representative Mudd asked if it is not a hard state of affairs where a man is called upon to fight under the law, and the Japanese method is a violation of the law. Admiral Sands replied: "That is true; but there is the instance of Honor, during the specified time. These provisions of law seem to me neither just nor judicious, and I am seriously concerned at the injury which I fear may be done to the dignity of the academy and even to the future efficiency of the navy if they are permitted to remain in force without amendment."

To ward off suspicion and make the crime appear to be the plot of the "Black Hand" society young Sherman dipped his finger in the blood of his victim and wrote on two cards which he placed near the corpse the inscription "K. C. Number 17." Sherman confessed the murder.

ENROACHMENT BY THE EXECUTIVE

Senator Bacon Declares Congress in More Danger Than The President.

SENATE TREATY MAKING RIGHT

Says it is Competent for Upper House To Frame a Treaty and Send It to White House.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Mr. Hale, who has been ill, was in his seat when the senate met today for the first time in three weeks and, at his instance, the senate consented unanimously to reconsider the votes by which the bill for the reorganization of the dental corps of the army and the bill increasing the efficiency of the medical department of the army were passed.

When the routine of the morning business was concluded, Mr. Patterson's resolutions relative to the recent Democratic caucus was read before the senate. Mr. Patterson announced that he would address the senate tomorrow, as Mr. Bacon was entitled to the floor today.

Mr. Bacon then proceeded with his argument on his Moroccan resolution. The speech, in the main, was a plea for the right of the senate to "advise and consent" in the matter of negotiation of treaties.

Mr. Spooner asked Mr. Bacon if he considered it the duty of a senator to give advice to the executive when asked, and Mr. Bacon replied in the affirmative. Mr. Foraker called attention to Mr. Bacon's contention as to the duty of senators to advise the executive, and asked the Georgia senator whether he thought the executive ought to be permitted to stand in the way of a senator's performance of his duty.

Mr. Bacon replied sharply that he did not know of any senator in a better position than Mr. Spooner to reply to such a question himself, but he modified the statement so as to relieve it of its personal application, and said that on account of reasons satisfactory to himself he declined to discuss the point further, saying that he would not anticipate "what will be a most interesting performance tomorrow, if we are correctly informed." He added that if the Republican caucus had not been held yesterday it was because they were held by a more potent influence.

Mr. Bacon contended that Congress was in far greater danger of encroachment from the executive than the executive from Congress. "Who does not know," he asked, "that the most influential part of the legislative power is at the other end of Pennsylvania avenue, the White House? I don't refer to the present occupant," he added, "but to all the occupants of the past generation." He added, however, that the tendency had never been more pronounced than it was today.

Mr. Bacon contended that if the United States should establish the precedent of taking charge of the fiscal affairs of Santo Domingo, conditions were such in other South and Central American countries as to render it probable that this country would assume similar duties there. "Not only are we to take on the duties of a trustee, but like duties are liable to be assumed and like calamities are liable to befall us in other countries," he asserted.

He instanced a condition of affairs in Costa Rica, saying they were similar to those in Santo Domingo. Mr. Bacon declared that not only had the senate the right to participate in the negotiation of a treaty, but it was perfectly competent for the senate to formulate a treaty and send it to the president.

Returning to the Algerias law conference, he said: "We are there in a powder house which may explode at any time—in a house with parties who may at any time fly at each other's throats." This statement elicited a smile from Mr. Spooner, and when Mr. Bacon insisted upon knowing why, Mr. Spooner replied that he was thinking of the unconcern of the man in that powder house.

Mr. Bacon declared that all Europe was aligned between France and Germany in anticipation of a war over the Moroccan question, and he read a London cable dispatch to the Washington Post in support of the statement.

Mr. Spooner followed Mr. Bacon, declaring his conviction that it was the duty of the president to send treaties to Congress. He then stated that he knew it to be a fact that Austria and Italy had refused to attend the conference if all the signatory powers, including the United States, did not attend. "Now," he added, "if anything on earth prevents war between two great powers, both friendly to us, it will be the assembling and the deliberations of the conference at Algiers."

During a colloquy between Mr. Spooner and Mr. Bacon concerning the resolution which the latter had introduced asking for information concerning the Moroccan question, Mr. Spooner said the request for information should have been made in secret session and there would have been no opposition.

"It was in secret session," and the senator did object," retorted Mr. Bacon sharply.

Mr. Spooner said the introduction of the resolution in open session was "grossly unfair," and after a further exchange, said:

"The intention was to bring the president to book before the people of the United States." Mr. Bacon's face grew redder as Mr. Spooner proceeded, and, interrupting Mr. Spooner, he warmly resented the imputation conveyed.

Mr. Spooner was quick in the dismissal of intentional affront, and the status quo was soon re-established.

Mr. Spooner declared that in the exercise of his duties the president is "uncontrolled and uncontrollable" and not answerable to us or the other house. He said a resolution demanding information from the president would be an insult.

Mr. Spooner concluded at 10 p. m., and after Mr. Lodge had given notice of a speech on the railroad rate question for next Monday, the senate went to executive session, adjourning at 5:25 p. m.

LIFE INSURANCE CASES.

Dist. Atty Jerome is Ready to Proceed Criminally.

New York, Feb. 6.—Witnesses in one of the life insurance cases which have been under examination by the district attorney's office were notified today to be in readiness to appear before the grand jury Thursday. This will be the first active step taken by Dist. Atty. Jerome in the criminal prosecution of life insurance offenders. It indicates abandonment on the part of Mr. Jerome of his original plan to have an extraordinary grand jury impaneled for the special consideration of life insurance cases. Whether an extraordinary grand jury will be impaneled later depends upon the number and character of the cases which the district attorney shall decide on as deserving of criminal indictment.

Mr. Jerome, it is stated, has practically decided upon a large number of prosecutions, and is only awaiting the publication of the report of the legislative investigating committee for the additional light it will throw upon some of the matters involved.

DATE FOR RUSSIAN ELECTIONS IS APRIL 7.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 6.—The elections to the national assembly are fixed for April 7. The opening session will take place April 22.
