GOOD WORK BY FIREMEN.

At the time the call was turned in the boys over at fire department headquarters were in the gymnasium, going through their morning exercises under the instruction of Nels Hebrich. Just as they were they jumped for their places and afforded an imposing spectacle as the apparatus raced down Main street. Nearly every one of the firemen had his gymnasium shoes on, while the drivers, who had no time to don coats en route, were hatless and clad in undershirts and trousers. They did not make a very smart appearance, but soon demonstrated, however, that a blue uniform and buttons do not make a fireman.

The loss was fully covered by insurance.

STRAWBERRY PROJECT.

Authority Granted to Construct Canal For Use of Power Plant.

(Special to the "News.") Washington, D. C., Dec. 6.—The secretary of the interior has granted authority to the reclamation service to construct a canal approximately three miles in length, to be used in connection with a power plant to be constructed for the generation of electricity at the mouth of Spanish Fork river, Strawberry valley irrigation project, Utah.

JUDGMENT AFFIRMED.

An Opinion Handed Down by the Supreme Court.

An opinion was handed down by the supreme court yesterday afternoon, affirming the judgment of the lower court in the case of the Honoring Mining & Milling company, appellant, vs. the Tellerday Steel Pipe & Tank company and the Utah Mining Machinery company. The suit was brought to recover an alleged overcharge paid by defendants for some pipe. The service of summons was made upon T. K. Elliott, who was said to be the agent of the Tellerday company. The company moved to dismiss the complaint and quash the service of summons on the ground that Elliott was not an officer of the company and service could not be made upon him which would bind the company. The motion was granted by the lower court and the case dismissed. This ruling of the lower court is now sustained by the supreme court in an opinion written by Justice Prick and concurred in by Chief Justice McCarty and Justice Straup.

COURT NOTES.

An action has been filed in the district court by C. E. Gable against W. H. Bally and Lem S. Brook to quiet title to 425 shares of the preferred stock of the Golden Sunbeam Mines company.

Judge Armstrong today granted Grace Y. King a divorce from William H. King on the ground of failure to support. They were married on Oct. 7, 1903, and have one child, the custody of which was awarded to plaintiff.

Annie D. Wigert today filed a petition in the probate division of the district court asking for letters of administration of the estate of Nils A. Wigren, who died on Oct. 8, 1906. The estate consists of real property in this county valued at \$1,000.

Suit has been filed in the district court by Peter Larsen against the Utah Consolidated Mining company to recover damages in the total sum of \$10,735.30, for injuries to plaintiff's arm and crops caused by the smoke from defendant's smelter.

The Merchants' Protective association today filed suit in the district court against J. A. Headland to collect the sum of \$104.50 alleged to be due as commission on the collection of a bill placed in plaintiff's hands by defendant for collection. According to the complaint Headland collected the money through other sources after he had given plaintiff the account to collect and hence refused to pay plaintiff any commission.

Suit was filed in the district court today by Timothy J. Bayton against Anna Olson Barrett and W. T. Barrett to quiet title to the west half of lot 18 and all of lot 19, block 1, West Boulevard addition and also to a one-half interest in a flowing well on said property. Plaintiff also asks damages in the sum of \$200 for being deprived of the water of said well by defendants.

John W. Tobin filed suit in the district court today against John R. Barrett and Annie M. Meyer to foreclose a mechanic's lien upon part of lot 4, block 96, plat D. The lien was filed to secure a claim of \$207 alleged to be due for plumbing in a house constructed by Barrett for Mrs. Meyer. In addition to that amount judgment is asked for \$50 as attorney's fees and \$23 costs of filing the lien.

In the case of Sadie M. Campbell against the Oregon Short Line Railroad company, which was tried in Judge Lewis' court, the jury has returned a verdict in favor of defendant, no cause of action. The suit was brought to recover \$10,000 damages for the death of plaintiff's father, W. W. Bartlett, who was killed at Blackfoot, Idaho, by falling under a train while attempting to board it.

The jury in the case of Salt Lake City against Charles F. Sullivan, which was tried in Judge Ritchie's court, has returned a verdict in favor of defendant for \$300, which is the valuation fixed upon the land of defendant condemned by the city for a right of way for the Big Cottonwood conduit.

Plaintiff claims that the above amount is due him from Palmer and he wants the county to hold it out of the money due Palmer on the bridge contract.

A decree of divorce has been entered in the district court in favor of Sidney H. Davis and against Edith R. Davis. They were married on June 1, 1896, and defendant deserted plaintiff on June 1, 1905. The custody of their children was awarded to defendant and the court orders plaintiff to sell all of his property and divide it equally with the defendant and in addition to give her alimony in the sum of \$3 per month for the support of the child.

Bank Clearings.—Today's local bank clearings amounted to \$1,321,667.42 as against \$1,055,207.04 for the same day last year.

Mr. Bangs will lecture in Barratt hall tomorrow evening under the auspices of the Mutual Improvement Lecture bureau, upon the topic "From Adam to Ade."

Musical Service.—The First Baptists will hold a special musical service next Sunday night, when Miss Alice Davis will appear in public as violinist for the last time, as she moves Monday next to Oakland, Cal., where her father is a typist on one of the local papers. Sunday evening's program will include a stereopticon display of Christian mission scenes in the orient.

Driving Association.—A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Spanish Fork Driving association was filed with the secretary of state today. The capital stock of the association is \$10,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$25 each. H. C. Jex is president; Henry Gardner, vice president; R. W. Greer, secretary; A. B. Rockwell, treasurer. The association will construct and maintain a race track at Spanish Fork.

Reward For Swindler.—Two hundred and fifty dollars reward has been offered by the Ohio Bankers' association for the arrest and conviction of Hans Q. Peterson. Peterson is a noted swindler wanted in various parts of the United States and in Canada. He is a Scandinavian and came from Ottawa to Mount Vernon, Ohio, where he posed as a prospective student to one of the college professors. The latter helped him to draft his money from one bank to another. Later a check of \$100 was drawn from the Ohio bank and Peterson disappeared. He put in his appearance in Salt Lake early this week and tried to work the Utah Commercial and Savings bank. Cashier Byron Groo, however, would not pass out money until the bogus deposit had been verified by the Mount Vernon authorities. Peterson then disappeared, leaving his draft deposit of \$850 which has been sent to Ohio.

ACTIVITY IN REAL ESTATE MARKET.

Dealers Report Many Important Deals Pending—Small Transactions.

PRICES ARE GOING HIGHER.

Announcement That Auerbach's Are To Erect Ten Story Steel Building is Without Foundation.

There is a full tide in the real estate market, although dealers report a number of important deals pending, and quite a number of small transactions for record. Dealers report not a few property owners are putting up prices which prohibit doing business with them. One owner was encountered this morning, who was satisfied with \$1,200 for one piece of property a year ago, but who now wants \$2,500 for the same thing. He was refused by the dealer who approached him. A morning paper reports "an announcement that P. Auerbach & Bro., have determined to erect a 10-story steel structure on the site of their present Main street building." Mr. Auerbach is in New York and will not be back until the holidays, and the management said today, that the statement was entirely untrue, and no such announcement had been made. Furthermore the story printed recently that Mr. Salisbury had been offered \$6,000 per front foot for the Kenyon, is characterized by him as entirely without foundation.

W. G. Bradshaw, the well known Los Angeles realty dealer, was the guest this noon, of F. W. Little at the Commercial club, where he told a "News" reporter that he had such faith in Salt Lake's prospects that he was holding on to his properties here for a good price, and would not sell unless he secured his price. Mr. Bradshaw believed in building ahead of the wants of the town. He said this was tried in Los Angeles, where there were many number of people who predicted failure; but the policy was persisted in and proved a winner, for by building ahead conveniences for living and doing business were so rapidly increased and multiplied that it made it easy for people to move in and settle and engage in business. He believed in all of the proposed buildings being built, for it would encourage immigration. Then the construction of interurban roads would surely bring in trade, and play an important part in the development of the city. The interurban system has proven of immense advantage to Los Angeles, bringing in so many people from the outside to do business in the city. Mr. Bradshaw called attention to the fact that Salt Lake is the natural and only center of the great mining region of this part of the United States, and everything connected with such interests centers here. He has great faith in the future of the city.

A. E. HUTCHINSON IS APPOINTED

Named as the Purchasing Agent Of Utah Light & Railway Co.

VICE GROESBECK, RESIGNED.

Oregon Short Line Official Will Have Several Millions to Spend for Streetcar Company.

Albert E. Hutchinson, general purchasing agent for the Oregon Short Line system, was today appointed general purchasing agent for the Utah Light & Railway company, vice Hyrum Groesbeck, resigned. Mr. Hutchinson will from this time on act in the dual capacity for both Harriman corporations, while Mr. Groesbeck has gone to Nevada to engage in mining.

It is anticipated that the new purchasing agent for the street car company will have his hands full during this winter securing the necessary equipment for the building of additional cars, the erection of an up-to-date gas plant, the purchase of new cars, steel, tires and a score of other items.

Just how much the Harriman interests will spend in improving their recently acquired property has not yet been decided. In their estimate, however, they will have access to the budget drawn up by Manager Campbell some months ago, when he set forth the pressing needs of the company to meet the growing requirements of Salt Lake. This budget, which is carefully itemized, called for improvements aggregating \$2,600,000 during the next three years. How much more the Harriman interests will deem advisable time will tell, but it is safe to assert that the budget will call for enough to keep Mr. Hutchinson decidedly busy during the next year or so.
